therefore:



Bill #36 Intramural Recreational Sports Fund Increase

WHEREAS, Intramural (IM) sport Supervisors are employed because of their expertise in a specific sport and they perform multi-faceted employment responsibilities such as:

- 1) maintaining the safety and welfare of all participants and contest officials
- 2) ensuring that all playing equipment is safe to utilize
- 3) ensuring that the indoor or outdoor playing facility does not present a hazard to the participants
- 4) appropriately attending to first aid emergencies
- 5) ruling on game protests
- 6) receiving feedback on the participants' and officials' perceptions of the quality of the IM program
- 7) officiating a contest if a scheduled official is sick or has a sudden emergency
- 8) rescheduling games in the outdoor intramural program postponed due to inclement weather conditions and contacting all involved with the scheduling changes
- 9) maintaining the positive image of the Intramural Program

each Intramural Sport Supervisor should be paid \$4.25 per hour instead of the present rate of \$3.40 per hour; and

WHEREAS, Intramural contest officials for all IM team sport programs (i.e. Coed

Volleyball, Women's and Men's Slowpitch Softball, Women's and Men's Indoor Soccer, etc.) are employed because of their prior Officiating experiences in non-SUNY Oswego programs and are expected to perform the following employment responsibilities:

- 1) provide for the safety of thousands of Intramural participants
- 2) maintaining fair play for all participants in each specific Intramural Sport Program
- 3) appropriately responding to first aid emergencies
- 4) ensuring that playing equipment purchased by SA is not stolen
- 5) maintaining the positive image of the Intramural program

each Intramural contest official should be paid \$4.25 per hour instead of the present hourly rate of \$3.10 per hour for all sport officials, except for the present \$3.35 hourly rate for Volleyball officials. (Note: Volleyball officials are presently paid slightly more than all other officials, as approved by SA, because our students can choose to officiate in the City's Volleyball League Program for more than \$4.25 per hour.) ; and

WHEREAS, lifeguards are employed based on their earned certifications as required by the NYS Health Department and the County of Oswego Health Department, for which they have personally paid the appropriate fees, in addition to every lifeguard's BLS-CPR expiring each year which necessitates recertification, each lifeguard should be paid at least \$4.25 per hour instead of \$4.00 per hour; and

WHEREAS, Recreation Supervisors for Lee, Laker, and Swetman perform multi-faceted employment responsibilities such as:

- 1) maintaining the safety and welfare of all participants by properly checking facilities for safety hazards
- 2) checking and collecting ID cards to ensure that only members of the College Community are utilizing the facilities
- 3) providing appropriate first aid to injured participants and calling for medical assistance, if need be
- 4) issuing playing equipment
- 5) maintaining written equipment inventories
- 6) ensuring that appropriate activities are taking place in each facility
- 7) securing facilities
- 8) maintaining the positive image of the Supervised Recreation Program,

each Recreation Supervisor should be paid \$4.25 per hour instead of the present rate of \$3.35 per hour; and

WHEREAS, the position entitled "Intramural Administrative Assistant" involves the responsibilities as outlined on the attached sheet with the expectation being that the Administrative Assistant will be performing in between the level of the previous student employment categories and the professional Director of Intramurals Recreational Sports. The Intramural Administrative Assistant should be paid \$5.00 per hour instead of the present SA allocated rate of \$3.25 per hour; and

WHEREAS, presently a discrepancy exists in hourly rates between IRSA (non-Work Study students) and Work Study students (who receive at least \$4.25 per hour if not \$5.00 per hour) in each corresponding employment category. IRSA (non-Work Study students) must have the same employment responsibilities and employment expectations as Work Study student employees, for the sake of substituting for each other within each category so as to provide for the continuation of both the Intramural and Supervised Recreational Programs with qualified employees being on duty; therefore

Be it enacted by Student Association Senate of the State University of New York College at Oswego that all requested hourly rates for each category of paraprofessionals, as indicated in the foregoing paragraphs, be approved because all IRSA employees are presently being grossly underpaid.

Bill #37 Graduate and Part-time SA Fee Structure

- Whereas, the Student Association Senate passed the Enfranchisement Initiative this year, and
- Whereas, the Initiative called for billing Graduate and Part-time Students a pro-rated fee, and
- Whereas, most of these students cut the billing form out of the course newspaper and do "self-billing", and
- Whereas, the course newspaper was published before the Enfranchisement Initiative was even passed, and
- Whereas, because of this, if the fee portion of the Enfranchisement Initiative were to be put in force, the Bursar would have to mail about 1,500 people a "billing addendum" for the activity fee, and
- Whereas, this would not be an appropriate approach to include these students, and
- Whereas, in order to proceed with the Enfranchisement Initiative vis a vis a fee, the trustees policy as interpreted by SUNY will require us to hold a new fee referendum, therefore,

Be it enacted by the Student Association Senate of the State University of New York College at Oswego that the fee portion (item C) of the Enfranchisement Initiative (Bill #19) not go into effect until the Fall of 1994, as per the formula outlined in that bill, and

Be it finally enacted that the following question be placed to the electorate (all students) concurrent with off-campus Senate Elections:

Should the Student Activity Fee be mandatory for all students on a pro rata basis as specified in Senate Bill #19. (see below):


- WHEREAS, it is common knowledge that the off-campus students are poorly informed about the actions of the Student Association; and

Be it further enacted that of the eight (8) school year months, each Senator must attend at least four (4) meetings.



Fiscal Policy Enforcement Act
A Return to Fiscal Prudence

- Whereas, the Director of Finance is the agent of the Student Association charged with overseeing the budget of the **entire** Student Association, and
- Whereas, in the past budgetary chaos has ensued when projected revenue targets from the Association's subsidiaries are not met. In 1991, a budget adjustment of thousands of dollars had to be undertaken because of overspending coupled with income lag. Between 1987 - 1990, a fund balance of well over \$250,000.00 was depleted to dangerous levels, causing the Dean of Students to say that he would not sign any purchase order that would bring the Fund Balance below \$125,000.00 Last year income projections were not met, particularly PPB missed their income line by multi thousands of dollars, and
- Whereas, failure on the part of clubs and organizations to make projected revenue usually carries no punishment in the year of transgression, rather the club is punished in the next fiscal year, and
- Whereas, punishing a group of people in a club or organization for what happened the year before is unfair, and
- Whereas, after the fact punishment for fiscal irresponsibility does nothing to rectify the problem, and

Whereas, the President of the Student Association is empowered to execute the budget passed by the Senate--including income line enforcement, therefore:

Be it enacted by the Student Association Senate of the State University of New York College at Oswego that the following income generation policy be implemented immediately.

INCOME GENERATION POLICY 1993

The Department of Finance will divide annual income lines into thirds and set tri-mesterly (1/3 of academic year) income goals for each group with an income line.

Failure by a group or organization to meet a tri-mesterly income line will result in the organization being required to submit a written report explaining income shortfall. A group which fails to issue a report of explanation within two days of notification of a shortfall will have their funds frozen until the report is filed. A \$50.00 penalty will assessed as well. (Money from penalty will be credited to income line for group.)

If a group fails to meet income projections for both the first and second trimester, the Director of Finance is assigned to assess the situation by his expertise and further judgement to cap club or organizational spending at a level determined by the following formula:

$$\text{total allocation} - \text{unmet income}$$

Groups failing to comply with income lines will be allowed to name which accounts they wish to be frozen or partially frozen. If the group fails to recommend which accounts to freeze, the Director of Finance will decide.

As the offending group generates revenue, their frozen funds will be unfrozen dollar by dollar.

Exceptions in enforcement of this policy can be made by the Director of Finance when documented circumstances suggest income projections will be met.

Example of Policy

Ex: The Tree Lovers' Society has a total allocation of \$10,000.00 and an income line of \$4,000.000, making for a net allocation of \$6,000.00. At the beginning of the third trimester, the Tree Society had only made \$2,000.00 toward their income line. The Director of Finance would inform them that their spending was capped at \$8,000.00 and let them designate accounts for capping. A week into the third trimester the Tree Lovers made \$500.00 with a maple syrup sale. The Director of Finance would send them a memo relating to the Tree Lovers that their spending cap is now \$8,500.00. \$500.00 would be restored to the Tree Lover's budget.

Means of Execution and Accountability

All freezes must be executed in writing, and the Finance Department will report them to the Office of the President and to the Senate as soon as possible.

Delegation

The Director may delegate freezing power as per this legislation to the Assistant Directors of Finance.

Excess Provision

Groups who exceed their income line will be allowed to deposit excesses into any existing account for that organization with Finance Department approval.

Bill #46 **Proxy Senator Seats & Conflict of Interest**

WHEREAS, Proxy Senators are not elected representatives of students, and

WHEREAS, there have, in the past, been abuses made of the privileges and responsibilities entrusted to the voting seat position of Senator, therefore

Be it enacted by the Student Association Senate of the State University of New York College at Oswego that the Senate places a procedural restriction in the following manner on the abuses derived from conflicts of interest with Proxy Senators:

1. When a bill is first introduced to the packet, a proxy Senator may not sponsor a bill.
Justification: It is understood that they will in all likelihood not return as a Senator to speak on the bill if the elected/appointed Senator is doing his/her job.
2. Immediately after the bill sponsors speak, it will be an acceptable Point of Order for any elected/appointed Senator to question whether or not a Proxy may have a conflict of interest. If such a question is raised, the Proxy will immediately have the right to defend the Point of Order. A vote on the conflict of interest will ensue.

Further to prevent intentional misuse of this policy, the Senate may reinstate the Proxy into the debate (and vote) if another Point of Order is made (by an elected/seated Senator) that the Proxy does not, in fact, have a conflict of interest. This Point of Order will initiate a vote of the elected/appointed Senators only as to whether the Proxy may be reinstated.

3. The Senate President will automatically reinstate the Proxy after the bill in question is settled (either Passed, Failed, Tabled, Sent to Committee, etc...)
