Carole's Corner

The Christmas holidays are nearing and there will be many occasions that will require various types of wearing apparel. The one occasion that we are most concerned with at present is the college Christmas dance on December 17. Many of the college women have come to me and asked, "Just what am I going to wear to that dance?" or "What kind of dress do you wear to a semiformal dance?"

A floor-length evening dress is not usually worn to a semiformal affair. I would suggest that you choose a cocktail length gown of a dressy material. By dressy material, I mean that of velvet, satin, silk organza, nylon, chiffon and others that are similar. You may wear long or short gloves, whichever you prefer. Almost all colors of shoes with heels are appropriate. Choose the pair that will do the most for your outfit. If you do wear a shoe with a flat heel, one of satin or brocade finish will be most proper. Jewelry is sometimes a problem. Rhinestones or pearls seem to be the best solution when you are in doubt. Many other types of stone are acceptable.

The instructions for the men are comparatively simple. A white shirt is appropriate with a dress suit, usually dark, and a long or bow tie. A dress shoe should be worn.

Benedictine Monastery

On October 27, 1960, a bus with about thirty-five students left at 2:30 p.m. for the Benedictine Monastery near Elmira. The trip was sponsored by the Honor Guild of Corning Community College for the benefit of our student body. Father Aelric, a Monk of the Benedictine Order, met us at the Monastery store, and then led us on an almost complete tour of the Monastery grounds. The first stop of our visit was the octagonal chapel. This peculiar design was explained as being the oldest form of religious buildings. Inside, a main altar was in the center of the floor and on a slightly raised platform. Modern art window panes, as well as Middle-Age religious art, were also explained. The women were excluded from other points of interest — the dining room and library. Many pertinent questions were asked by the students and were directly answered by Father Aelric. To the amazement of many, and to the pride of some, this twentieth-century Benedictine Monastery appears to have changed very little from the standards set down by Saint Benedict in 530 A.D.

Bulletin Boards

There has been some confusion about the use of bulletin boards. Here is a list of bulletin boards and the recommended use of each:

Administration Building

- Basement: Large board opposite snack bar — strictly for student affairs.
- 1st Floor: (a) Large board by West door — athletics and Physical Education Dept.
- (b) Large board by East door — College administration use only.
- (c) Small board by East door — major student activity posters.
- (d) Center double board:
 - East side — faculty and administration notice to students.
 - Adjacent to East side — student messages to students.
 - West side — coming events, both all-college and student activities.

Houghton House

- 1st Floor: Two small boards for Library use only.
- 2nd Floor: New board in front hall for student use.

Everyone is urged to place neat notices and to remove notices and posters that are out-dated. Any notices from out-of-college organizations or enterprises must be approved by the Student Activity office (Ad. Bldg. 201), and publicity for commercial enterprises will not be permitted.
