Background and Rationale

• Supports for students with ASD are most often delivered through specialized instruction provided by special education teachers. Despite the fact that many students with varying forms of ASD are placed in general education settings, their general education teachers are rarely prepared to deliver appropriate instruction that meets their specific needs.

Program Goals

- To provide an opportunity for candidates enrolled in the Adolescence Education program to interface directly with students with ASD in various classroom settings
- 2. To identify evidenced based practices to support students with ASD in the general education setting
- 3. To provide specific training in data driven instruction
- 4. To provide opportunities for effective collaboration
- To identify external funding opportunities to sustain the program
- 6. To develop a model post secondary program that provides specialized instruction to Adolescence Education teacher candidates in working effectively with students with ASD which can be implemented at other colleges and universities.

The Clinically-rich Model:

- Weekly interaction with Clinical Mentors in various classroom settings
- Data collected on relevant topics
- Bi-weekly college seminar
- Online modules
- Pre and post assessments on weekly targets
- RCASD-Old Westbury- candidate and mentor collaboration in workshops
- Culminating activity: Create an empirically-supported guide for general education instruction in teaching students with ASD.
