CCC Comes to Life

Heavy discussion flared as Peter Johnson spoke to CCC students on Revolution and Canadian involvement in an unscheduled convocation held in the Large Lounge, Thursday, October 29. At approximately 12:15 an announcement was read over the Commons Public Address system as part of the afternoon announcements. The announcement read:

"Peter Johnson, from Toronto, Canada, will speak on Revolution and Canadian involvement in front of the Commons, Right now."

Five minutes later, the meeting place was announced as changed from outside the Commons to inside the Large Lounge.

The discussion began immediately upon Mr. Johnson's arrival in the lounge. After a short dissertation on his own advocacy of Revolution, reaction from the audience began pro and con. The audience split between conservative and sympathetic factions. Discussion soon reached a loud pitch.

Dean Beck was notified of the unscheduled convocation and entered the Large Lounge. Dean Beck is Dean of Students. After approximately five minutes he left the lounge to walk to the President's office. President Frederick was not on campus at this time. Dean Beck returned to the Large Lounge and removed Mr. Johnson from the convocation with the expressed intention to "Find out more about him and what he is doing here."

This action ended the convocation. However the debating among the students in the audience continued. A large group of students crowded around the entrance to the Commons office waiting to hear the results of the conference with Johnson within.

Beck left the meeting in the Commons office and issued a statement to the crowd. Beck's statement was as follows:

"No one walks in off the street with the purpose to force people to listen to him. He (Johnson) is not a student here. The existing policy is that in public areas, the dining room and this lounge be left open to students to use as they like. This can be reviewed at any time. I have and anyone else has the right to challenge any policy. If I ever see the type of situation where violence could occur, I will not let it occur. A lot of today was healthy but not according to the

established rules. We can speak out without fighting and screaming."

Henry Newlin was asked his views in the events of the day. His reaction was:

"There was a good lively discussion going and somebody tried to break it up. They were afraid something would happen and I don't think anything would have."

It was settled in an emergency meeting of Commons committee to change the policy now in effect as to the usage of the Large Lounge. A joint meeting of Student Government and Commons committee was held Friday in N 137, the student body was invited to attend. The written proposal to be voted on was attacked by the invited student body. The proposal essentially read that the lounge could be used for purposes "pertinent to the college." This phrase was attacked as to what is "pertinent." The only agreement at the Friday joint meeting was to postpone voting until Monday giving the two committees time to rewrite the proposal. Consequently, the results of the meeting cannot be published in the Crier because of the printing deadlines.

Dean Krech Resigns



Mr. Alan S. Krech, Assistant Dean of Faculty at Corning Community College, has resigned to accept the position of Planning Officer for the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education.

Mr. Krech will report directly to the South Carolina Commissioner of Higher Education and will be involved in long range planning for higher education in that state, reports Mr. Robert A. Chapman, Dean of Faculty at Corning Community College.

Mr. Chapman commented on Mr. Krech's resignation saying, "I have very mixed feelings in accepting his resignation. On the one hand I am delighted that he has been offered such an exciting and challenging opportunity but I am also aware of the loss to our own institution."

"I can think of no one who has evidenced a greater commitment to the growth and development of Corning Community College than Al has during his years of service to the College, its students and the community," Mr. Chapman said.

Mr. Krech joined the College in 1963 to teach English, rising to the rank of Assistant Professor prior to assuming the position of Assistant Dean of Faculty.

He holds his bachelors and masters degrees from Cornell University and is pursuing doctoral degree studies at that institution.

Mr. Krech and his wife Louise reside at 3147 Landau Rd., Horseheads, RD 1, and are the parents of three children.



Lights, Sounds, Action

Corning Community College presented ZONE: ON TOUR. This is a new media theatre production company directed by Harris Barron, Alan Finneran, and Ros Barron. The program consisted of: "Silver Seconds," "Oddities," "Space Strides," "Row, Row," and "-----." The presentation was held in the College gymnasium on Monday, October 26, 1970 at 1:00 p.m.

Laughter booms over the P.A. system. The sound of this laughter creates smiles on the faces of many of the students. This was the purpose of the sound. Easily led, aren't we?

Just as fast as it starts, the laughter disappears. The title of the first act is projected on the screen as "Silver Seconds." Sound then comes to give the appearance of an airport situation at a busy time of day. A man appears with a costume head shaped with a face surrounded with the number 3. He stands with a briefcase and newspaper waiting for something. His clothes are that of a businessman. The man is a live person. Behind him on the screen is shown the propeller of a plane moving. The noise of this plane is also present. Next, it is as though the plane lands and the noise of the airport returns. The man with the briefcase and newspaper leaves. There is the noise of the movement of machinery.


On a side platform, a stripper appears and does a dance. This happens sometime during the airplane ride. It is not part of the ride but it is more like her own separate world.

Next, on the main stage, wheelchairs appear. In the wheelchairs, ride a man and a woman in silver paint. They also carry a type of aluminum steps. They walk in a pattern or dance trying to get these steps to fit together. The music in the background is of machinery and the movement of the people are in coordination.

On the side stage appears a toy Raggedy Ann doll and a huge toy rabbit. Both of these toys give the movement of being mechanical. There is a music box type of music in the air.

At the end of the step scene the two persons are joined together. A zeppelin is projected on the screen. The zeppelin bursts into flames and crashes. An emotional voice describes the scene. The man and woman sit back down in their wheelchairs and leave. A phone starts ringing as they leave. It is left ringing.

The next scene is entitled "Row, Row, Row."



The song is sung. The picture is projected. The scene is over. Now, doesn't that thrill you?

"Space Strides" is the next act. First a man and a woman and a shield came into view. There is a flashing light and the music is that of one very high note after some movement is performed. Then the man and the shield leave. The one girl is left. She starts to walk in a certain pattern. On the screen is a color wheel which is ever changing. There is also an electric wheel to the side of the stage. The music seems to go along with the changes of color. The woman's legs reflect the movement. The speed of the music seems to increase. The color wheel flashes brighter with each pulse of the music. The man and a second woman join the first one on stage. The three of them seem to walk in a pattern of steps.

On the side stage, there is the magic show, which is to attract the audience's attention.

There is another intermission and this time the stage crew took down the center section. Now the players had a black background surrounded by white. The actors are now totally removed from the audience. The title of this act is "-----" and it is described as,

"The dots can't be connected and the dashes form a blur in the virtual volume of '-----'."

The actors are dressed in black accented by white areas. A black light showed only the areas in white. The actors, two men and a woman, start with movements of the body using the white areas of the costumes to accent the movements. Each person finally got into their own box where they put up ropes of green elastic. A dance is performed to the music of a Moog. The dancers vibrated and moved the bands to the music. Right at the end of show came next. They play the "Star Spangled Banner." The actors took their bows.

This performance is something which is hard to convey in words and still give it justice. One must experience it to get the true feeling of it. And this avant garde show is something which one could experience more than once.

Pete Left A Mark on CCC

The administration and student body are each asking a great deal of questions about their campus because of the events we saw last Thursday. Good ol' Corning Community College—nice and quiet, peaceful, isolated and select. We thought we had our campus all figured out, didn't we? I guess we did when you consider the activities that usually dominate CCC — Boredom, nice quiet, peaceful, isolated boredom.

What happened Thursday is merely that CCC was finally touched by what's really going on at other campuses and in this country in general. The concept of the happening is the most healthy thing ever to hit this campus.

This editorial is not going to be my telling you whether or not I agree with what Pete Johnson said last Thursday. That's irrelevant. What I'm trying to do is analyze the mark Pete left on Corning Community College. People are shocked by Pete's appearance in the Large Lounge. They find it hard to explain because this kind of thing is so out of context on this campus that, for many, Pete's only impression was that of shock and disbelief. They didn't even listen to what he said. Some were so busy thinking of the next dirty name they could call Johnson; they too were left out of the message.

Now a word to you people who were in disagreement with what Pete said. You were the loudest people at the rally. I'm speaking of the side some people would call conservative. Dig this, you people. Whether or not you like him or agree with him, you have to realize that Pete's technical logic was infallible. He knows his views and he knows how to put them into the air. Think back to Thursday. Everytime someone tried to attack Johnson, he got screwed into ground under the force of Johnson's rationality. Pete's got his shit together on this thing. He knows his topic and he is aware that he knows it. Some of the people attacking Johnson knew little or nothing about their topics.

When people see Pete get the best of you, you're made an ass of, Pete is made out to be a together kind of guy. He can win some people over merely by creating this kind of impression. You can hurt your cause by creating the impression you subject yourself to. Pete is smart enough to use this as a tactic in his speech deliverance. He needs assholes like you or he can't speak as effectively. If, by speaking up and yelling louder than anyone else about something you can't argue about, you think you're fighting people like Pete, you are wrong. You are helping them out.

This point is only to inform you of the most effective way of fighting people like Pete, if that is what you feel you need to do. That would be to attend speeches, but not to say a word. Don't give him a chance to use the most caustic logic he has at his command. That being the logic in his put-down technique. Besides, at the same time you are going to be listening, for once, to what is being said. You just may learn something. What's the matter—that scare you?

Things are God damn cool. They're making bread and "getting fat." You sure can't say that about the Blackman in general.

Kent State: The Perfect Crime

I do not think (or hope) that there are any students who go to CCC that have not heard of Kent State. Kent State was the campus on which four students lost their lives when a national guard unit played God and shot randomly into a group of students to break up a rally. Immediately afterward, our glorious leader, Dicky, told us, the citizens, that the guard unit was just doing their job, the best they could. So now, we can see how believable the national guard unit was, and also see that protesting may be a capital offense. Let's not forget Jackson State, where three students were killed in a similar incident. So, in these two incidents, a total of seven students lost their lives in these campus disorders. Many of the students were not even active in the rallies, but rather, were shot while walking to classes several hundred yards from the actual shooting. In these two incidents, more than five hundred rounds of ammunition were fired! Imagine if each one bullet had hit a person! Enough of that, now to the most relevant portion of this article.

The Federal Bureau of Investigation (F.B.I.) conducted a private investigation concerning the incidents at both Kent State and Jackson States. In the FBI's report, it states, "that the killings were unjustified and unnecessary." I can safely say that there are many of you people reading this article who are not aware of the FBI's report. Don't blame yourself if you have not read this report, because, for some unknown reason the hierarchy of our nation did not think the report was relevant enough to present to the people and therefore filed away for safe keeping and dust collecting.

Now, at Kent State 25 people (members of student faculty) are being prosecuted for inciting

a riot! Not one person has been arrested in connection with the death of any student. If the report by the FBI is right, its publication should not be withheld from the public any longer, but should be published so we may see both sides of the incidents and establish true justice. Evidently it seems like the "in" thing to do. Well, to add to your long list, I've gathered some of the more unusual facts about pollution.

Dig this: if you don't breathe, naturally you die, right? Yet dirty air shortens life with every breath. Did you know that in 1952, four thousand people died in London within four days because of smog? Unfortunately it's true and that was eighteen years ago, before most of you could read. Think what it must be like now!

Under our present advising and pre-registration procedures, cancelling a day of classes in order to have pre-registration is not the most effective or convenient way. We will, therefore, have classes on that day which shows in the

College Catalog as "Tuesday, November 10 — Pre-registration for spring semester—Day classes suspended."

The Educational Policies Committee will be asked to consider the recommendation that classes be cancelled on Tuesday, December 15 (the last day of classes) and that final examinations begin on that day rather than on Wednesday, December 16. This would allow us to have the last day of final exams on Saturday, December 19, or Monday, December 21 (depending on the final exam schedule program), rather than ending on Wednesday, December 23, as shown in the catalog.

We do not have all the details all worked out yet, but tentatively, academic advising and pre-registration will take place December 1 through December 15. Clark Maloney will be getting details to you shortly.

Professors should advise their Tuesday classes that they will meet on Tuesday, November 10. Evening classes will be held on Tuesday, November 10, also, because they were never cancelled.



Corning to Sub-Regionals By Defeating Alfred and Cobleskill

What a week for our soccer team! Coach Jos Oscsodal's Baron Booters accomplished a number of firsts by virtue of some great team play. First of all, Corning became the first soccer team in the college history to compile a winning (7-5) season. They also became the first soccer team in Corning history to gain a place in the Sub-Regional Tournament and last, but not least, they became the first team this season to shut out powerful Cobleskill (Monroe, Morrisville, and Broome couldn't do it).

In last week's article, I said Corning had given up the idea of playing as a team; they proved me wrong. But while proving me wrong, they also proved me right because I did say they could play with the best if they played as a team. They played as a team and not only stuck with the best, beat them too.

Alfred

Going into the Alfred Tech game with a 5-5 record and desperately needing a victory, Corning eked out a 3-1 victory. Steve Speta put Corning on the scoreboard first with a first period goal on an assist from Jorge (Rivelino) Ulloa. Later in the same period, Ulloa attempted a goal, it deflected off a defender and then Ulloa rammed it past the goalie for a 2-0 lead at the end of the first quarter. A goal in the second period by Alfred made the score 2-1 at half-time.

Early in the third period Sr. Ulloa made his second goal of the game (19th of the season) on a penalty kick, to end the scoring. With the temperature in the 30's, the game became a defensive struggle. Goalie Scott Cushing and defenseman Jerry Holden and John Savino thwarted Alfred's offensive attempts.

With the victory, Corning assured themselves of at least a break-even-season—but the best was yet to come.

Cobleskill

Proud Cobleskill came into Corning with a record of 10-1, their only loss a double overtime setback to Broome 5-4. Embarrassed Cobleskill left Corning with a 10-2 record via a 1-0 setback to an aroused Corning team.

Heroes were a dime a dozen as Corning player after player came up with incredible plays to halt the high-flying visitors. The game was played in conditions somewhat similar to water polo, with slipping, sliding, and swan dives the order of the day.

Coach Joe Oscsodal decided not to play Ulloa at defense and went for some quick goals. After only a minute of play, Ulloa boomed a shot that seemed sure to be a goal. Only a great save, not only by the goalie, but by a puddle resembling Lake Superior prevented the ball from going into the goal. The first half was scoreless, but the tone of the game was set as Corning was

gradually taking place. Ali Kassamali was all over the field and seemed to attract trouble wherever he went. Ali's hard-nosed play proved to be a big factor in Corning's control of the game. Mohamed (Fauz) Kassamali also played an aroused game although he was injured in the second half.

Corning started fast, and as always Jorge Ulloa made the big play to get Corning on the scoreboard. Ulloa took a pass from Fauz and dribbled deep into the right corner. Jorge then kicked a beautiful pass to tough Mark Donahue cutting down the center. Donahue showed great determination in fighting off the defenders and ramming it into the goal for the only goal of the game.

The defense headed by Holden, Kashmer, Savino, Tolhurst, and McRae was outstanding as was the offense led by the Kassamalis, Ulloa, Donahue, Schushureba (George) and Williams. However, the biggest "pat on the back" goes to goalie captain Scott Cushing. Not only did Cushing make some just unbelievable saves, he was the inspirational leader. He showed tremendous courage diving for shot after shot, and his excellent goal kicks put Corning back on the offense time and time again.

It was great to see Corning get together again, it couldn't have happened at a better time for Corning meets Monroe Friday,

November 6th at Geneseo in game one of the Sub-Regional Tournament. (Monroe beat Corning 2-0 earlier, Corning played without Ulloa). Regardless of

how Corning makes out in the Regionals, they have already accomplished much to be proud of. I hope you students appreciate their efforts.

Cross Country Team Finishes Season


