The second story is called “Ghost Children” which is based on a true story about a 16-year-old boy who murders his parents as well one of his sisters.

The kid goes to jail and gets visited there by his other sister, who ran away from home fifteen years. “It’s about memory and the way we run away from things that are painful to us”-

said Jason Radalin.

Even though the two stories are different by context but “both are about survivals”- said Radalin. “What it means to survive something brutal.”

Radalin is the one who has to figure out how to stage both stories. His decision was to stage them in a complete different way. “The Filmmaker’s History” will show “a realistic stage, costumes and even lighting”- mentioned Radalin.

“Ghost Children” will be more “theatrical with no scenery” and will take place in a “big open empty space”.

Two opposite staging but thematically connected stays behind Radalin’s idea. An interesting fact is that actors are doubling roles which mean people will see same actors representing two or more different characters.

The Play is mostly made “in a form of movie” -said Radalin instead as a classical

old play. Radalin description is “a more cinematic” play.

Then if the student agrees to display it, it will be then put in the hallway.


The midterm project for Mr. Gessinger's 2D design class was the end of the black and white series.

The midterm assignment involved a third color required in the drawing-grey.



The new color made the project harder but by this time the student "should already have a good understanding" of the whole process, said Mr. Gessinger.





