Revised Proposal, May 3, 1976

The Departments of Nursing and Social Work propose the offering of a dual degree option in these programs to a selected and limited number of qualified students. This proposal is based on trends in the expansion of knowledge about human problems, and in the organization of human service programs. It is intended to educate professional practitioners capable of providing more comprehensive and integrated services to persons and families with health and social problems. It is an innovative demonstration of cooperative effort which is unique in baccalaureate social work and nursing education in the United States.

To qualify as applicants, students will complete, during their freshman and sophomore years, the liberal arts core courses, pre-requisite courses for nursing, and two sets of human service courses. During the sophomore year students will apply to both the nursing and social work programs through the normal departmental application process. Upon acceptance into these programs, students will enroll in both social work and nursing courses during the junior and senior years. In addition they will enroll in courses during each of two half-summers at the end of the regular junior and senior years. Graduates completing the dual option in both programs will receive the Bachelor of Science in Nursing in May of the senior year, and will receive the Bachelor of Science (Social Work) in August of the same year.

This proposal is in accord with policy and criteria for awarding two degrees established by the New York State Education Department and the State University of New York. The proposal also has the formal support of faculty in the Departments of Nursing and Social Work. In addition, precedent exists for awarding two degrees at Brockport.

This proposal does not involve the establishment of a new academic program. Courses are neither added to nor deleted from the present approved programs in social work and nursing. Only the scheduling of some courses has been modified. All quantitative and distribution requirements in the liberal arts are provided for in the total of 137 credit hours involved in this option. The attached course schedule and distribution requirements provides a detailed description of the elements of this proposal.
