Attached is a proposed change in the anthropology major research methods requirements.

1. Background:

1.1. Anthropology currently has a two option major (which we will retain). Option 1 is a liberal arts track and Option 2 is a pre-grad school / pre-professional track.

1.2. Currently, requirement D (*anthropological methods*) in Options 1 and 2 allows students to meet the requirement by taking one of five courses (ANT 394, 403, 405, 441 or 442)

2. Proposed change:

We wish to change requirement D in options 1 and 2 to require a single course (ANT 394—Research Methods in Cultural Anthropology).

3. Rationales:

3.1. Major focus: The primary focus of our program is in cultural anthropology. This change will reinforce that focus.

3.2. Common experience for majors: ANT 394 will provide a unifying and integrating experience for upper level anthropology majors, and will allow us to reinforce disciplinary research and writing in the context of a single course. Also—in the past—ANT 394 has served as a lead-in to Scholars Day, something we wish to expand.

3.3. Postgraduate concerns: There is a growing market in business and government for anthropology graduates with research experience. ANT 394 will provide our graduates with expanded postgraduate opportunities.

3.4. Efficiency: In the past, enrollments in our research courses have been low. Requiring a single research methods course will assure higher enrollment in ANT 394, will make better use of faculty and will allow for more effective short term and long term planning.

3.5. Effect on other methods courses: We will continue to offer the other methods courses on the basis of demand. Students may still apply them to requirements C and E (Option 1) or C and G (Option 2).

My understanding is that this will probably constitute a "minor change" and will thus not require the extended review attending large scale program changes.

The attached documents provide side by side comparisons of existing and proposed options 1 and 2, respectively.

Existing Major, Option I.

Option I. Liberal Arts Anthropology Option (37 credits):

A traditional "stand-alone" major for students who are interested in anthropology but who will probably not enter anthropology as a career, per se. Such students might include those with another major outside of anthropology or students in pre-professional programs such as pre-law, pre-medical, elementary and secondary education certification. Option I provides students with a broad perspective on anthropology by including within it courses in each of the three sub-disciplines (Socio/Cultural Anthropology, Physical/Biological Anthropology and Archaeology).
