Convocation Speaker Named

Harry Elmer Barnes, newspaper columnist, sociologist, historian, criminologist, and authority on world politics, will speak on a timely subject at the convocation program here on Nov. 28, at 11:00 a.m.

Mr. Barnes, the author of numerous textbooks, including "The American Way of Life" used by Economics classes here at State Tech, is one of the leading educators of the country. It has been said that Mr. Barnes has the rare gift of bringing large public questions into clear, understandable scope.

Having recently returned from a trip to Europe, he is well able to present to us an up-to-the-minute interpretation of world affairs.

SEMINAR ROOM OPENED

TYRRELL TO ATTEND CONVENTION



LETTERS FROM THE ALUMNI

Hello Everyone,

Well, I'm spending a twelve weeks' enforced vacation in this land of beauty, as the residents refer to it. Most of my fellow recruits refer to it by various other names.

It hasn't been bad so far. Very good food, movies with \$.12 admission, combination soda fountain and General Store. The only drawback is that you don't finish drill and cleaning the barracks until 4:30 and then you have to wash all of your clothes. At ten you have to be in bed and you get up at 5:30 a.m. Sometimes you have a two hour watch during the night. I have tonight.

We have only about three hours a week of actual marching drill. We march to and from classes and meals. We are shown a lot of training films and listen to lectures. Each platoon has a barracks of its own (60 men to a platoon). If you have had any previous military service including Naval Reserve, armed guard, or any reserve unit, they make you a temporary petty officer during your boot training period. They also have rifle practice, swimming and seamanship. Saturdays and Sundays we have off.

I didn't intend to write a book length letter when I started, but I thought perhaps some of the boys from State Tech were planning on joining the Navy, and I thought perhaps if they read this, they would have a lot better idea of what was in store for them during boot camp than I had at the time I enlisted. State Tech's 1950-51 Varsity Basketball Squad

CHARLES BORSAVAGE: Forward, 6 ft. 1 in., 175 pounds, 19 years old; a regular from last year's Binghamton Central basketball squad, an aggressive rebounder and an excellent shot from outside.

BEN CLARKE: Guard, 5 ft. 10 in., 160 pounds, 20 years old; a former Binghamton North star, Ben last season sparked the Hornets to an impressive 24 won - 2 lost record, shattering the single season State Tech scoring record in the process as he racked up 420 points in 26 games for a 16.1 average.

JERRY FULLER: Forward, 5 ft. 11 in., 175 pounds, 24 years old; an excellent ball handler and a smart rebounder, this former Vestal Central captain who also had three year's experience on Navy teams, should be a big asset to the Hornets in his first year with the squad.

BERNARD KAMP: Center, 6 ft. 2 in., 195 pounds, 21 years old, a former star at St. Patrick's parochial school of Binghamton, Bernie in his second year with State Tech is the most improved ball player on the squad; a big, rugged rebounder, he also has developed an accurate hook shot.

ROBERT KOLTZ: Guard, 5 ft. 9 in., 170 pounds, 20 years old; another varsity ball player from Binghamton Central; a good ball handler and a fine one-hand shot specialist; first year with the Hornets.

PAUL KRCH: Center, 6 ft. 3 in., 195 pounds, 30 (yes, thirty) years old; one time captain at Binghamton Central and teammate of Billy Gabor, Paul was a unanimous choice to captain this year's State Tech squad; a poised, experienced pivot man who can throw in that "clutch" basket, Krch is married and has a two year old daughter.

MIKE LaCAVA: Guard, 5 ft. 8 in., 152 pounds, 19 years old; former Norwich High School captain, Mike is another greatly improved ball player; quick and court wise, he has an excellent one-hand shot and in his second year with the Hornets should figure prominently in the success of the 1950-51 club.

JOHN PAVLIC: Guard, 5 ft. 8 in., 145 pounds, 22 years old, a veteran CYO, Army, and semi pro ball player, John is a newcomer to the State Tech squad after seeing service in Korea; an aggressive, driving ball player and a good set shot.

AL PEARSALL: Guard, 6 ft. 1 in., 165 pounds, 21 years old; a former captain of the Trumansburg High basketball team, Al last season was a fixture in the Hornet lineup and saw more service than any other man on the squad; a fine floor man and rebounder, Al was outstanding defensively and was also very capable of scoring from inside or out when baskets were at a premium; although a foot injury has forced him to miss the first month of practice, it is hoped he will be ready for action for the season opener.

ROBERT ROSS: Forward, 5 ft. 10 in., 175 pounds, 21 years old; another Binghamton North alumnus, Bob is an aggressive, driving ball hawk and a prolific scorer; a hold over from last year's Hornet team.

JERRY ROTHWELL: Forward, 6 ft., 158 pounds, 18 years old; a varsity basketballer at Elmira South Side high school, Jerry reports to the Tech squad sporting an outstanding football and baseball background; a very fast and shifty basketball player.

DON SMITH: Guard, 5 ft. 11 in., 170 pounds, 19 years old; a product of Cortland high school, Don is starting his second year with the Black and Gold; a vastly improved performer, Don is a deadly shot and a steady influence on the court.

KEN ZEHNER: Center, 6 ft. 3 in., 175 pounds, 18 years old; after three years of varsity ball at Narrowsburg Central when he captained the team, tall, rebounding Ken Zehner with his accurate hook shots is a welcome addition to the Hornet squad.


