Scholastic achievements are in the news this week:

Dick Truchon has completed the requirements for his degree of Master of Science for Teachers in Mathematics at the University of New Hampshire.

Joe Milensky has been awarded a \$1,000 grant from the American Society for Engineering Education. He will study for six weeks this summer at a nuclear defense institute in Honolulu.

Harold Hickey will spend six weeks this summer in Peru, as he has been selected to receive a \$750 grant as a participant in the College Faculty Latin American Summer Field Work Program. The funds were made available by the Ford Foundation to the University of the State of New York, which chose Prof. Hickey.

Herb Durst is in Detroit Monday and Tuesday as part of an ECPD accrediting team visiting the Detroit College of Applied Science. This is the second leg of a two-part accreditation trip for him, as he visited the Salem School of Technology in Salem, Ohio, last week.

President Tyrrell will be the moderator on Wednesday night at an executive panel, sponsored by the Binghamton Chapter of the American Institute of Industrial Engineers at the Arlington Hotel.
