Dr. Jewett moved to amend further that the Society reimburse the members of the Milk Commission for the money they have expended in carrying on the work of the Commission. Seconded.

The motion with the amendments was carried.

The Directing Librarian made a report, which was on motion, duly carried, accepted and placed on file.

Dr. Browning moved that the suggestion of the Directing Librarian for the formation of an auxiliary committee to aid the work of the Library to be formed of such members of the Society as are willing to contribute a certain fixed sum of money each year be adopted. Seconded and carried.

The President announced additional gifts to the Library Stack Fund, making the sum total to date \$7,000.

The report of the Trustees was read, and, on motion, duly carried, accepted and placed on file.

The President declared that Section 1, Chapter 17, of the Constitution and By-Laws, under the ruling of the By-Law Committee of the Medical Society of the State of New York, was at variance with the by-laws of the State Medical Society, and, therefore, unconstitutional. In accordance therewith the President ruled that Section 1, Chapter 17, was unconstitutional and inoperative, and being so could not be amended.

No appeal was taken from this ruling.

The Tellers appointed to canvas the ballots cast for officers and delegates announced their report (to be found at the end of the reports), and those candidates who received election were duly declared by the Chair.

There being no election for Directing Librarian, it was ordered that an election take place at February meeting.

## REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION.

To the President of the Medical Society of the County of Kings:

SIR—The Committee on Legislation have the honor to present the following report of the year's work: At the time the committee entered on its duties the bill legalizing osteopathy and conferring on them the right to issue death certificates, attend midwifery cases and to practice minor surgery after a course of study which required but twenty months' work was then pending in the Legislature. Your committee conferred with the committee of the association and agreed upon a vigorous campaign against the measure. The chairman of your committee wrote a brief embodying the principal arguments against the bill. By agreement with his colleagues, this brief was placed on every editorial desk in Greater New York and with the assistance of Dr. J. T. Duryea was sent to every member of the Legislature. The Chairman of the committee visited the city editors of all the important journals in Manhattan, my colleagues attending to the editorial rooms of Brooklyn. As a result almost all the papers came out with strong editorials against the bill. Your Chairman did not appear in person before the Senate Committee for the reason that Dr. Elsner appointed Dr. Browning as the representative of the State Society from Kings County, and it did not appear likely that the Senate Committee would listen to two representatives from the same organization.

By some strange inadvertance the brief of your committee was published as a part of the report of the committee of your predecessor. Nevertheless, both the Chairman and each of the members of that committee have stated that this was done without their knowledge or consent. As this brief was written *after that* committee had gone out of office it should naturally appear in this report. It has, however, already been printed as stated and will not, therefore, be repeated.

Senator McCabe sent to your committee Senate bill 506 which gave Boards of Health the right of compulsory vaccination. This matter was brought up by your committee before the Society at the March meeting and it was voted that the Society approve of the bill. Notice of this action was sent to Senator McCabe.

Bill 727 which contemplated the shortening of the medical course by one year for graduates of registered colleges was sent to your committee for an opinion. Inasmuch as it was favored by the Regents, and inasmuch as the fourth year in college was made to count as the first year of study in medicine, there seemed to

be no reason for opposing it, and Senator McCabe was so informed. No further legislation came before your committee for action. You are already familiar with the fate of the bill in favor of the osteopaths.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC HEALTH.

Under this head the Milk Commission of the Society was permitted to report.

NEW YORK CITY, Jan. 20, 1903.

To the Medical Society County Kings:

The Milk Commission beg to submit the following brief summary of their work for the year.

At the October meeting of the Society a preliminary report was made embracing in a general way the work of the commission and the results obtained at that time.

It is unnecessary, therefore, to repeat what was then said as to the organization and methods employed. There are at the present time five milk dealers who are serving milk under the authority of your commission, putting out about 1,200 quarts per week. They are:

H. S. Chardavoyne, 406 Court St.  
Wm. H. Evans, 250 Hewes St.  
Meadow Brook Dairy, 984 Fulton St.  
Diamond Dairy Co., Sixth Ave., cor. Pacific St.  
Isaac Rushmore, 100 Atlantic Ave.

Your commission has distributed about 38,000 labels for bottles. This represents the amount of milk sold under the label of the commission for the first six months of actual business. It was found necessary to do considerable preliminary work in the laboratory, and during this work some interesting figures were obtained, some of which are summarized below.

Analyses were made of samples of milk collected from various sources about the city for comparisons. These are divided for purposes of comparison into five classes, viz.:

1. Bottled Milk collected in City.
2. Bottled Milk shipped direct to the Laboratory by dealers.
3. Samples bought from cans (directly from dealers in grocery stores).
4. Samples bought from cans (directly from dealers in grocery stores).
5. Certified Milk.

The chemical examination included the Sp. Gr. Acidity, total solids, fat and solids not fat. The bacteriological examination included only a count of the number per cubic centimeter. An isolation of species is under progress but the result of this work is not ready for publication. No attempt has been made, therefore, to determine the number of *pathogenic bacteria*, and the total number present must be regarded as merely an index of the general cleanliness and care in keeping the milk. It may, therefore, be taken as a guide to the general fitness of the milk for food when taken in the raw state; for, the number of bacteria determines to a large extent the liability of a milk to create digestive disturbances, especially in young children. The examinations of bottled milk bought at different sections of the city

showed it to be of good quality so far as the chemical analysis goes. The fat ranged from 3.05 to 4.95 per cent. with an average of 3.8 per cent. The total solids varied from 11.41 to 14.2 per cent. with an average of 12.55 per cent. Number of samples 24. Bottled Milk sent by dealers gave for fat an average of 118 samples, total solids 12.98 per cent. and an average of 4.13 per cent. of fat.

Milk bought from cans, 10 samples, gave an average of 12.03 per cent. of solids and 3.58 per cent. of fat. Twenty-four samples of grocery store can milk gave a range of solids from 8.21 per cent. to 12.83 per cent. with an average of 11.8 per cent. and of fat from 2.11 per cent. to 4.05 per cent. with an average of 3.37 per cent. Of Certified Milk 43 samples gave a range for the solids of 12.69 to 15.22 per cent. with an average of 13.74 per cent. The fat varied from 3.85 to 5.90 per cent. with an average of 4.50 per cent. The bacteria in these five classes of milk have, of course, varied greatly as follows:

1. Commercial Bottled Milk, average 265,600 per 1 c.c.
2. Bottled Milk sent by dealers " 568,800 " "
3. Canned Milk from depots.....2,484,000 " "
4. Canned Milk from stores.....9,679,000 " "
5. Certified Milk..... 13,900 " "

Range of latter class 700 to 30,000 per 1 c.c.

It will thus be seen that the dealers have had little difficulty in keeping the bacterial count of the Certified Milk well within the limits set by the commission. The same may be said in relation to the chemical composition.

It has developed in our work that the acidity of the milk bears no fixed relation to the number of bacteria, and the commission has recently decided to abandon their requirement as to the acidity. They have also decided to make the bacterial requirement 15,000 instead of 30,000 per c.c. for the months of December, January, February and March, beginning December 1, 1903. It will be noticed that both in chemical composition and in bacterial contents "grocery milk" is vastly inferior to average bottled milk. While the average fat content is up to the State legal requirement the total solids fall below the requirement of 12 per cent. Many of the samples fell below the legal standard in all respects. Forty-one and seven-tenths per cent. of these samples contained over 10,000,000 bacteria in 1 c.c. and only 4 per cent. of the samples contained as low as 100,000 per c.c. These figures show that the average "grocery store milk" is the poorest milk of the market, and that its use should be discouraged for any purpose. These figures also show that in bacterial contents Certified Milk is superior to the best commercial bottled milk in the ratio of 13 to 265.

The commission takes pleasure in announcing that the Trustees of the Hoagland Laboratory have again placed the Society and the citizens of the Borough of Brooklyn under a debt of gratitude by voting to place the laboratory and its whole equipment at the disposal of the commission for another year. During the past year practically the whole time of the Bacteriologist, Dr. Wilson, and the Chemist, Mr. Randolph, has been devoted to this work. There have been examined 285 samples of milk, both chemically and bacteriologically, and most of these in duplicate or triplicate.

Only those who have done such work can have any

conception of the amount of routine work which this represents.

It is needless to say that the work of the commission cannot be carried on without a well-equipped laboratory and at least two well-trained men.

The commission has been embarrassed in its work because of the lack of money. The funds for the expenses of the commission have been furnished by the personal contributions of its members. The cost of printing and distributing circulars, etc., and the time devoted to inspection of dairies has been borne by the members of the commission.

This may be well enough when the enthusiasm of the members is fresh, but it cannot long be conducive to permanent enthusiasm or to the best work. Whether our successors will be willing to continue this precedent remains for them to say. In order to make this good work permanently successful the entire medical profession should give it their support.

In order that all the physicians of the Society may know where Certified Milk can be had the commission recommend that the names and addresses of the dealers who serve this milk be published each month in the *Journal of the Society*. Respectfully submitted,

#### REPORT OF THE DIRECTING LIBRARIAN.

Mr. President and Gentlemen:

The progress and growth of the Library during the year just ending has been in every respect satisfactory, although to one not acquainted with the work of a great library, the crowding of books in the Librarian's office and room adjoining would seem as if the work was going backward rather than forward.

No great effort has been made to get any large collection of books for three reasons. First, there were no large libraries to be had; second, if there had been we did not have the place to shelve them, and third, our Library does not need any large collection of works on general medicine, our efforts now must be to get books on special subjects. From now on it is quality rather than quantity that we are to strive for.

It will be seen by the next paragraph that the individual donations have not fallen off but that there has been a slight increase over previous years.

#### DONATIONS AND ACCESSIONS.

The Library received during the past year about 2,500 volumes, 8,000 pamphlets and 26,000 numbers of journals. In addition to the 2,500 bound volumes above mentioned, there is awaiting presentation a Library of 2,000 volumes—most of them will be of the greatest value to our Library. This added to the year's accessions will bring the books obtained during 1902 up to nearly 5,000 copies.

Donations have been received from the following sources:

One that deserves especial mention is a valuable addition to the historical collection of seven handsomely bound volumes of the biographical records of every member of the Society from its foundation, presented by Dr. William Schroeder. The Society owes Dr. Schroeder a debt of gratitude for his labors in collecting this valuable data and for presenting it bound in such handsome style,

The *Brooklyn Medical Journal* has, through its exchanges, brought to the Library an increased number of new and valuable books. In actual money value over \$1,000. This increase reflects credit upon the management of our medical publication. The *Journal* and the income from the Zabriski Fund are the only sources outside of individual donation from which books are obtained.

ZABRISKIE MEMORIAL LIBRARY FUND.

The same journals are subscribed for and bound as per last report, with the single addition of the *American Journal of Anatomy*.

COMPLETING THE STACKS.

The close of the year shows the completion of the stacks with provision for shelving about 65,000 additional volumes.

The honor for this achievement is due our esteemed President, Dr. Henry A. Fairbairn, who, by personal appeal and untiring effort addressed to every source of possible interest, has collected \$7,000.

We all appreciate the energy, tact and unremitting work the securing of such a sum represents.

Our earnest thanks and admiration are tendered to him for his untiring work for the Library.

Few of us are able to head a subscription list with such a generous donation as did our President and Dr. Barber; and it is rare to find a medical man with the qualities necessary for collecting large sums of money, but we all possess our mites of talents and money, which in the aggregate will enable us to keep ours one of the foremost libraries in the land.

FOREIGN JOURNAL ROOM.

The rapidly growing files of foreign periodicals, obtained through the *Brooklyn Medical Journal* exchanges has made it necessary to get additional shelf room. By permission of the Trustees book racks are being built around the small room adjoining the Librarian's office. This will be known as the Foreign Journal Room, where a fairly complete file of foreign publications will be found.

BOOKS OF THE SECOND DISTRICT DENTAL SOCIETY.

The Second District Dental Society has transferred to our Library the title to all books deposited by them in our Library at present or in the future. The dental section of the Library is to be known as the "Library of the Second District Dental Society," being the Dental Section of the Library of the Medical Society of the County of Kings, established 1902. The Dental Society will make an annual appropriation for binding and increase of this section.

This transfer was accomplished after a number of conferences between your Directing Librarian and the Librarian of the Dental Society. The Council approved of the agreement at its October meeting.

## ACCESSIONING AND CATALOGING.

In addition to cataloging all new material, satisfactory progress has been made in completing a new printed card catalogue of the whole Library.

It is estimated that nearly one-half of the total number of volumes in the Library are now properly cataloged and accessioned.

## ASSISTANT LIBRARIAN.

To meet the rapidly increasing work of the Library the Trustees granted the engaging of a paid assistant librarian. She was employed early in 1902, and all of the cataloging has been turned over to her.

## REGISTRATION OF READERS.

Two thousand and seventy-two readers have registered their names; as an evidence of the increasing interest in the Library we find that this is more than twelve per cent. over last year's registration.

There were loaned to members for home use 543 volumes. This feature of the Library does not seem to be fully appreciated, for the loans are about the same as they were during the previous two years. This point is emphasized to impress upon the minds of the members of the Society the fact that they are allowed to take home the books and pursue their research at their leisure, and also that through our Library any member can borrow books from the Surgeon General's Library in Washington and the Library of the New York Academy of Medicine.

## MEDICAL LIBRARY AND HISTORICAL JOURNAL.

The first number of this new journal has just appeared. Its editor is Mr. Huntington, our Librarian, to whom the Council granted the privilege of publishing it from the Society's building. It is believed that the new publication will not only be the means of securing many additional accessions to the Library, but will also extend its influence and give it a widespread publicity.

## INDEX MEDICUS.

The resumption of the publication of the *Index Medicus* has been hailed with satisfaction by the medical profession. As you know, it is published under the auspices of the Carnegie Institute, in Washington, and is one of the results of the great munificence of this Patron Saint of libraries, who will, no doubt, be glad to have earned the gratitude and aided the advancement of a profession always anxious to help and better humanity.

## COMPLETION OF JOURNAL FILES.

We are sadly in need of money to complete and carry on files of journals already on hand and also to secure new special publications that cannot be obtained in exchange. To partially meet this demand a plan is maturing that it is hoped will help us out.

## BINDING.

Attention is again called to the urgent need for funds for binding, exclusive of the binding done by the Zabriskie Fund and the Dental Society, only \$60 has been expended for this purpose by the Society during the year. We need at least \$5,000 to cover arrears in binding, and the current accessions call for a yearly expenditure of at least \$700. Respectfully submitted,

DR. WM. BROWNING:

In connection with the report I wish to present a matter it touches upon. Dr. Winfield has mentioned a plan that has been talked over by a number of gentlemen for the formation of an auxiliary body, whatever name may be determined upon. Nothing formal, however, has been done. It is believed that at least one hundred members can be secured, who will be willing to give annually a certain sum, perhaps \$10, to constitute an additional fund. That will be an organization, the benefits of which will be one-sided, wholly for the good of the Library and the Society. The formal steps to start that meeting will be taken in a month or so, and if such members as are willing to take part in it will give their names to President Cox or the Directing Librarian or myself they will help the matter very materially. By that plan we shall be able to carry on the files of the journals we now have nearly up to date but which lose their value if not kept up, and we shall also have a small fund on hand to purchase collections of books which we know or learn of but which now, unless someone puts their hands in their pockets temporarily to take them in, are lost to us. Some such plan is necessary to carry the work on. The Society itself cannot be expected to do this, but a number of the members of the Society may act together for that purpose.

What I wish for the time being is to present the matter so that every member may have a knowledge of it, and then no one can feel slighted. We want everyone, but interesting the members in it is somewhat a matter of personal effort. I doubt the advisability of a special committee.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES.

Mr. President and Members of the Medical Society of the County of Kings:

The Board of Trustees was organized in February by the election of officers. The change in the by-laws which makes the Directing Librarian a member of the Board, *ex officio*, has been found advantageous as that officer from the nature of official duties is able to call the attention of the Board to matters relating to that branch of the Society's work. The meetings have been well attended. If every member of the Board had been present at every meeting there would have been eighty-eight attendances; the record shows that there were sixty-nine.

There were ten regular and one special meeting and the attendance was as follows: Dr. Winfield, the Secretary of the Board, was present at eleven meetings, as were also Drs. Gordon, Fairbairn and Browning; Dr. McNaughton was present at nine meetings, Dr. Jewett at eight, Dr. Fowler five and Dr. Hunt at three. Excuses were usually sent when a member was unable on account of illness to be present. The House Committee which consisted of the Chairman of the Board, the President of the Society and the Directing Librarian, had charge of the immediate needs of the property of the Society and the scheme has been a satisfactory one.

The John Lloyd Zabriskie Memorial Fund represents the only permanent deposit of the kind in the possession of the Society, and the splendid results of this fund makes conspicuous the desirability of more like it.

Anyone making such a gift may be sure that the income therefrom will be judiciously expended in the line of medical education. The ordinary repairs on the

building have been looked after by the House Committee—fortunately there have been few. Our building has not disappointed in its excellent arrangement. The superficial blennish which appears as a sort of designation is only skin deep, and, while unpleasant to the sight, means only a temporary derangement which can be cured as soon as the Board of Trustees feel like making the necessary expenditure. The unsightly peeling is the result of applying the finishing coat to a surface that was not sufficiently dry to receive it, a condition frequently found in buildings of fireproof construction. It is to be hoped that the Society will soon find itself enjoying such financial prosperity that our building can again be made beautiful in all respects. This Board has enjoyed the distinction of finishing the stack room which is now practically complete. This was made possible by the energy and determination of our President, Dr. Fairbairn, who not only secured the subscriptions but collected them so that as a result of his efforts there were presented to our Treasurer seven thousand dollars, a sufficient sum to cover all the expenses of the new stack.

We now have accommodation for a hundred thousand volumes. Of the many subscribers who contributed this there are three (3) who deserve special mention. First, that of the Skene Memorial Alumni of the Long Island College Hospital, amounting to the sum of \$480. It is expected that a suitable tablet will be placed in the building to the memory of our late distinguished member, Dr. Alexander J. C. Skene, whose work in his specialty added much to the favorable reputation of our Society both at home and abroad. The subscription to the amount of fifteen hundred dollars given by Dr. Calvin F. Barber, had long been under consideration and a full knowledge of the needs of the Society determined the giving at this opportune time. A tablet has already been placed in the reception room of the building in memory of his lamented father, who, as surgeon to the Kings County Hospital, is particularly and affectionately remembered by many who were in one way or another connected with that old institution. Many times he proved his devotion to the sick poor by refusing work which carried with it compensation to devote his skill to the needs of the most friendless in the county. Many young men were benefited by his kindness and consideration. His was a life for emulation. At the Jenner dinner, given by this Society a few years ago, it was my privilege to sit next to the late Prof. Pepper, whose reputation as a raiser of funds almost equaled that of writer and clinician. Thinking that something might be learned, I asked him about his methods. His reply was prompt and somewhat startling: "The solicitor must himself make a large contribution, then he can present an argument capable of meeting all objections." His statement made a deep impression, but in that particular application the pocket was too weak even to test his theory. Not so with our President, Dr. Fairbairn, however. He adopted the tactics of our late distinguished colleague, Prof. Pepper, with the result that has been already reported by the Treasurer. In the report of the Board made at the last annual meeting Chairman West called the attention of the Society to the necessity of furnishing the Library stacks, and I can best express his feelings by quoting his words, which were as follows: "If any member knows from whence to obtain this necessity and will turn it in this direction he will confer

a lasting benefit upon posterity." Our President solved the problem and posterity will surely reap the benefit. In this instance it was also the desire of the donor to commemorate his father's memory by the placing of a tablet in the reception room. Mr. President, the Board of Trustees expresses their grateful appreciation of your work, and with this you may be certain of the gratitude of each individual member of the Society.

The Board of Trustees have to do only with the financial side of the *Brooklyn Medical Journal*, and it is with extreme satisfaction that it is able to report a saving to the Society of about six hundred and fifty dollars through the year of 1902. It is not the expectation of this Society to make a profit out of this enterprise other than that which comes from exchanges and books for review. The value of the *Journal* in this connection may best be learned from the report of the Librarian.

The books of the Treasurer have at his request been audited, and it is almost needless to say found correct. The Society at this time is in the best financial condition it has ever enjoyed. Taxes paid to date and no floating debt. Prosperity is with us and we have only to continue our efforts for the common good of this organization and we shall see it a shining example of unselfish work which will be copied in other sections of the country. The Committee on the Directory for Nurses have added to the funds of the Society to the amount of \$500, a record which speaks for itself. The Board of Trustees desire to express their thanks to this committee for financial aid from that source.

The Neurological Society have asked and received permission to erect a drinking fountain in memory of the late Dr. William H. Haynes, an active and loyal member of this Society, who was continuously working for its benefit. The selecting by the Neurological Society of this form of memorial is a happy one, as the Doctor had from time to time made contributions of money for this purpose and this will be supplemented by the Society members to the amount necessary for the completion of the fountain.

Our prosperity has been discussed, and it is only proper to mention some of our needs. First, in the matter of promptness of paying dues by the members. This criticism is not intended to include a very small number who for some reason are unable to pay their obligation with as much promptness as the member would like, but to the large number who through carelessness allow their dues to remain unpaid until the Board finds itself embarrassed by the want of funds. The Trustees have on two occasions been obliged to secure a temporary loan. If all dues are promptly paid all obligations of the Society will be promptly cancelled. The indebtedness on our property amounts to thirty-six thousand dollars. Some scheme should be devised for a sinking fund so that this may be paid off or at least reduced in amount. Each year there is an increased number of young men who are in the enjoyment of increased incomes who have not previously contributed to the building as much as they can now afford. Why would it not be well to put in working shape a subscription fund of this kind? A very little personal effort on the part of all who can afford to do so would soon free this Society from debt.

During the past year nothing has been done on the taxation reduction; indeed, our assessment valuation has been increased a little. Owing to the prevailing views

on this question of taxation in the State it seemed an unpropitious time to make the effort for exception. It is still difficult for the Board of Trustees to understand why a medical organization in another part of the city doing similar work should be exempt from taxation while we are yearly obliged to pay taxes on our property. Truly the ways of the law are peculiar.

In closing this report the Board of Trustees feel that this is a time for felicitous congratulations. The affairs of the Society have never been in so good a condition as at this moment.

AMENDMENTS TO BY-LAWS.

When the business of amendments was reached the President read the following letter:

HENRY A. FAIRBAIRN, M.D.,

*President Medical Society County Kings.*

In reply to your inquiry of the 15th inst. the Committee of the Medical Society of the State of New York regards Section I, Chapter xvii of the By-laws of the Medical Society of the County of Kings as opposed, repugnant to and at variance with the By-laws and sentiment of the State Society.

In the event of formal presentation for approval and for reasons above named this committee will withhold its endorsement of Section I, Chapter xviii as not being in accordance with the State Society.

The President said: The laws of the State of New York regarding the organization of medical societies (Chapter xiv) state concerning the By-laws of the respective societies "that it shall be lawful for the respective societies to make such laws and regulations relative to the affairs, concerns and property of said societies, relative to the admission and expulsion of members, relative to such donations and contributions as they or a majority of the members at their annual meeting shall think fit or proper: Provided, that such by-laws, rules and regulations made by the Society of the State of New York be not contrary to, nor inconsistent with the Constitution and laws of this State or of the United States; and that the by-laws, rules and regulations of the respective county societies shall not be repugnant to the by-laws, rules and regulations of the Medical Society of the State of New York, nor contrary to, nor inconsistent with, the Constitution and By-laws of this State or of the United States."

Again, Art. 36 "that from and after the passage of this act it shall be lawful for any county medical society in this State entitled to representation in any medical society in the State of New York, and the homeopathic Medical Society of the State of New York, to establish such rules and regulations for the government of its members as they may deem fit, provided the action of such receive the sanction of the said medical societies representing such county medical societies and is not inconsistent with the laws of the State."

Applying these rules to Section I, Chapter xvii of the Constitution and By-laws of the Medical Society of the County of Kings we find, first, that it not only has not received the sanction of the Medical Society of the State of New York, but that the Committee on By-laws of said Society unanimously refuse such sanction and they base their refusal on the fact that said section is opposed, repugnant to and at variance with the By-laws and sentiment of the State Society. It is, therefore, plainly inoperative and unconstitutional, and the President rules that any amendment is unnecessary and out of order. An appeal was requested by the President but none was made.

No amendment was introduced.

The decision, therefore, stands and the Medical Society of the County of Kings reverts to the regulations of the Medical Society of the State on questions bearing on ethics.
