## 6-Point Directive Sent to Protestors

Harris L. Woodford, president of the State University at Old Westbury, last night announced that he had sent a six-point directive to students "still in control" of some of the buildings on the temporary Planting Fields campus.

In his statement to the protestors, Woodford said that: "In dealing with this protest, I have kept these aims in mind:"

1—to consider the points the protestors are making, without yielding under pressure.

2—to continue the principle of student participation without student domination.

3—to protect the right of all members of the college community including the rights of those who are not protesting.

4—to maintain mutual inquiry and the continued operation of the college without disruption of its essential purposes.

5—to prevent violence or threats of violence to persons or property through college action or court injunction, if possible without the use of police force.

6—to take action so that individuals who violate the law are brought before a court of law for a fair trial and so that police action against large groups does not become necessary.

A group of students from the Non-White Caucus took over some of the buildings and the college switchboard Saturday in the urban studies department.

The non-white students in the 85-student experimental college have demanded that a provost of their own choosing be named to head the unit by Thursday, that a dismissed faculty member be rehired, and that machinery to handle student grievances be established.
