

BSTI Has Four Delegates At Regional U.S.N.S.A. At Rochester Institute

Mary Lemoine was the senior delegate, and Vince Adolpho, John Carpenter, and Joyce Powell were the three junior delegates to the New York State Regional Conference of the United States National Students Association last weekend. The meetings were held at the Rochester Institute of Technology on March 31 and April 1 and 2. BSTI delegates were guests at the Hotel Rochester.

In an interview late yesterday Vince Adolpho said, "Most inspiring to us from BSTI was the address which Dr. Lawrence L. Jarvie, executive dean of the technical institutes and community colleges of the State University of New York, gave at the dinner meeting Saturday evening. He chose as his topic, "Today and Tomorrow." He said, "The future is what we make of today. What we do today definitely implements tomorrow."

The three-day conference included plenary sessions, nominations, a dinner dance, an editor's forum, and special worship services for Catholics, Jews, and Protestants. There were also several opportunities for informal get-togethers. All four BSTI delegates agreed that these informal sessions were almost the best feature of the conference. They also praised highly the careful arrangements made by the students and faculty of the Rochester Institute, and their friendly graciousness.

Regional member colleges include Alfred University, Bard College, BSTC, BSTI, Canisius College, Clarkson College of Technology, College of St. Rose, Cornell University, D'Youville College, Fredonia State Teachers College, LeMoyne College, Niagara University, Rochester Institute of Technology, Russell Sage College, St. Bonaventure College, St. Lawrence College, Siena College, Skidmore College, Syracuse University, University of Buffalo, University of Rochester, Eastman School of Music, Utica School of Commerce, William Smith College, and these three divisions of the University of Rochester—the College for Women, the School of Nursing, and the College for Men.
