New President Takes Over August 1

Peter J. Cayan was appointed by the State University of New York Board of Trustees on May 26, as president of the College of Technology. The current president of North Country Community College at Saranac Lake will begin his new duties on August 1.

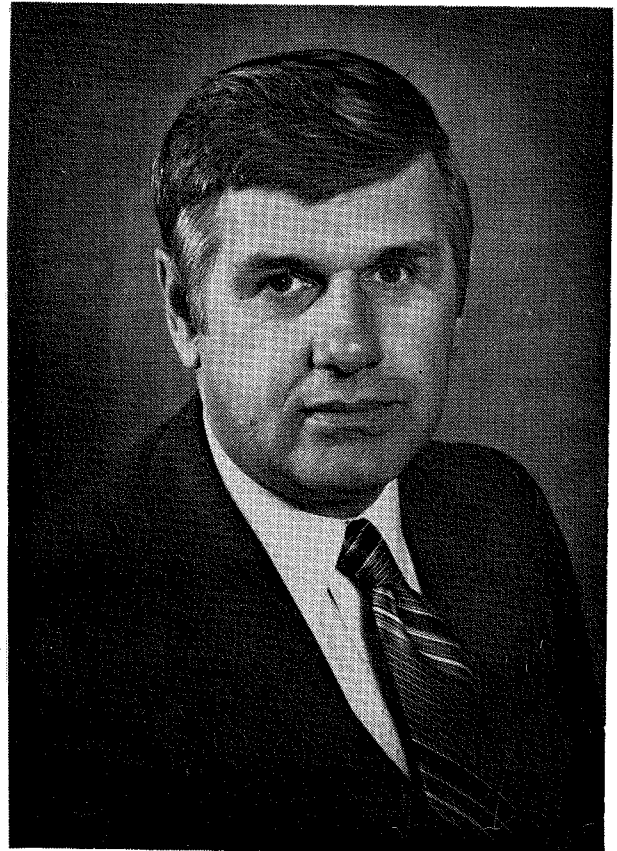
Dr. Cayan's appointment was submitted to the Board of Trustees by Chancellor Clifton R. Wharton, Jr. on the unanimous recommendation of the College Council. He was selected from nearly 100 candidates by the Council during a national search for a chief executive to replace President Kunsela.

As president of North Country Community College since September 1976, Dr. Cayan has been instrumental in the design and construction of the college's new campus as well as the rehabilitation of existing buildings.

During his tenure, North Country Community College developed branch campuses and established the Center for Adirondack Studies, North Country Center of Gerontology and the Crafts Management Program.

Dr. Cayan has overseen the implementation of academic program review, long-range planning, regional accreditation, curriculum diversification and the computerization of administrative and academic functions.

Before assuming the presidency of North Country Community College, he served at the State University of New York Agricultural and

Class of '82 Receives Diplomas

The eighth annual commencement exercises of the College of Technology might be summarized in four words - pride, praise, protest and participate.

The pride began with the more than 700 graduates honored for the successful completion of their studies. But it did not end with the presentation of the diplomas. The parents and friends of the graduates, the faculty and administrators who had guided the students to their goals shared their pride in achievement.

Praise for the leadership and endless work by retiring President William R. Kunsela was offered by the main speaker David Hurd, chairman of the College Council, as well as the student body representative Brian Acker, and members of the board and faculty. President Kunsela was credited as the man most responsible for making the dream of a new campus a reality.

A protest against the transfer of selected programs to other campuses was registered by many graduates wearing gold ribbons on their gowns. Acker urged students and their parents to write state legislators in an attempt to retain the programs.

Hurd told graduates to remain active and participate in the fight against nuclear war, help find a solution to the crime problem and prevent the erosion of American freedom.

Diplomas were presented by President Kunsela, assisted by James R. Phifer, dean of arts and sciences; John E. Cook, dean of business and public management; Louis J. Galbiati, dean of engineering technology; Edward J. Sabol, dean of health sciences and public services; John W. Glenn, director of vocational-technical teacher education; James

Dr. Kunsela Honored at Retirement

At a testimonial dinner June 11, President William R. Kunsela was surrounded by nearly 400 friends, associates, and family members recounting his 41 years of service to higher education and wishing him long years of happiness in his retirement.

Among the speakers who paid tribute to President Kunsela were John M. Brophy, former vice president for academic affairs at the College of Technology; Earl W. MacArthur, president of SUNY Agricultural and Technical College at Canton; Murray Block, deputy to the Chancellor for Campus Liaison, representing the State University of New York; Emlyn I. Griffith, regent, New York State Education Department; E. Porter Felt, former chairman of the board of the Chamber of Commerce of Greater Utica, Inc., and George B. Grow, former chairman of the College Council of the College of Technology.

Master of ceremonies was William R. Williamson, president and general manager of WIBX/WIBQ. The invocation and benediction were offered by the Rev. James F. Quinn, pastor of St. Paul's Church, Whitesboro.

Co-chairmen of the planning committee were Jack Kennelty and Edward Ratazzi, executive officers of the Utica and Rome Chambers of Commerce.

Serving as president of SUNY Agricultural and Technical College at Delhi for 18 years and at the College of Technology since 1973, President Kunsela has held chief administrative offices longer than any other person in the SUNY system.

He notes some of the changes he has seen since joining the system in 1955. The number of students enrolled has grown by more than 10 times from 35,000 and the budget is now more than \$1 billion, he said. Four medical centers, several specialized schools, and four community colleges have been added.

"There has been a major transformation in the system. It has grown from a group of small teachers' colleges into a system with very good, comprehensive institutions," President Kunsela said.

President Kunsela has brought about a major transformation in the two colleges which he has headed. When he arrived at the College of Technology, it was housed in a portion of the first floor of Building 1, employed nine persons, and its students were part-timers enrolled in a graduate program conducted by SUNY at Cortland.

He has not only guided the college to becoming an upper division institution offering 16 professional programs to more than 3,600 students, but has also stood firm on the need for a permanent campus in Marcy. Plans for the construction have been stalled and side-tracked numerous times, but President Kunsela, with the cooperation of community leaders, brought the dream to reality.

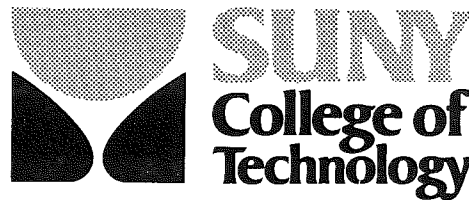

Office of the President

Dear Alumnus:

This will be my last letter to you as president of your alma mater. I shall be fully retired come August 1, 1982. Barb and I will be relocating to Sarasota, Florida, permanently. However, we expect to spend the hot months in upstate New York and we will eagerly follow the progress and achievement of the College of Technology for the rest of our lives.

You may have already heard that a new president has been appointed to take my place the 1st of August. Dr. Peter J. Cayan comes to us from the presidency of North Country Community College at Saranac Lake. With your support, he will do an outstanding job of helping the college reach its full potential.

Dr. Cayan will have the delightful task of building the Marcy Campus. The first major contract has been awarded and construction of the first building will get underway within weeks. This is not a promise; it is a fact. Our first building will contain facilities for classroom, laboratory, library, and administrative functions. In addition, the plan includes academic, student activities, and service buildings as well as a dormitory complex. According to plan, all of this will be completed by the fall of 1986, ten years behind our original schedule.

By now, you have heard that the Alumni Association has undertaken a fund drive to establish an endowment in recognition of my contributions to the college. This is a part of an overall appeal initiated by the College of Technology Foundation, Inc. The Foundation has created the Kunsela Endowment Fund and is in the process of approaching the people in the Mohawk Valley for support. The interest income will be used for student financial assistance. Each \$10,000 of endowment monies will generate enough resources for us to award to a deserving student a \$1000 scholarship, assistantship, or a grant-in-aid in the name of the donor.

You will be pleased to learn that corporate and philanthropic agencies have already pledged and/or given \$60,000 for this purpose. Included in this sum is a gift of \$5,000 from the Class of 1982 and a pledge from its leadership to raise a matching amount from its members during the next three years. Perhaps other classes will want to seek recognition through a similar pledge, but either as a class or as individuals, I am counting on your support for our college. I feel a little self-conscious in making this appeal. Quite frankly, I don't care whether or not you want to recognize me, but it is important that you get behind this effort. And that is what counts!

Every college president's job specification calls for fund raising. Because I have been consumed with survival, academic, economic and political problems during my tenure, the college has not had time or energy to seek your financial assistance until now. To reach the levels of excellence we both envisage for the college, we are going to need your sustaining support for years to come. Your contribution demonstrates that you share these sentiments.

It has been my pleasure to serve you. I shall cherish memories of our days together.

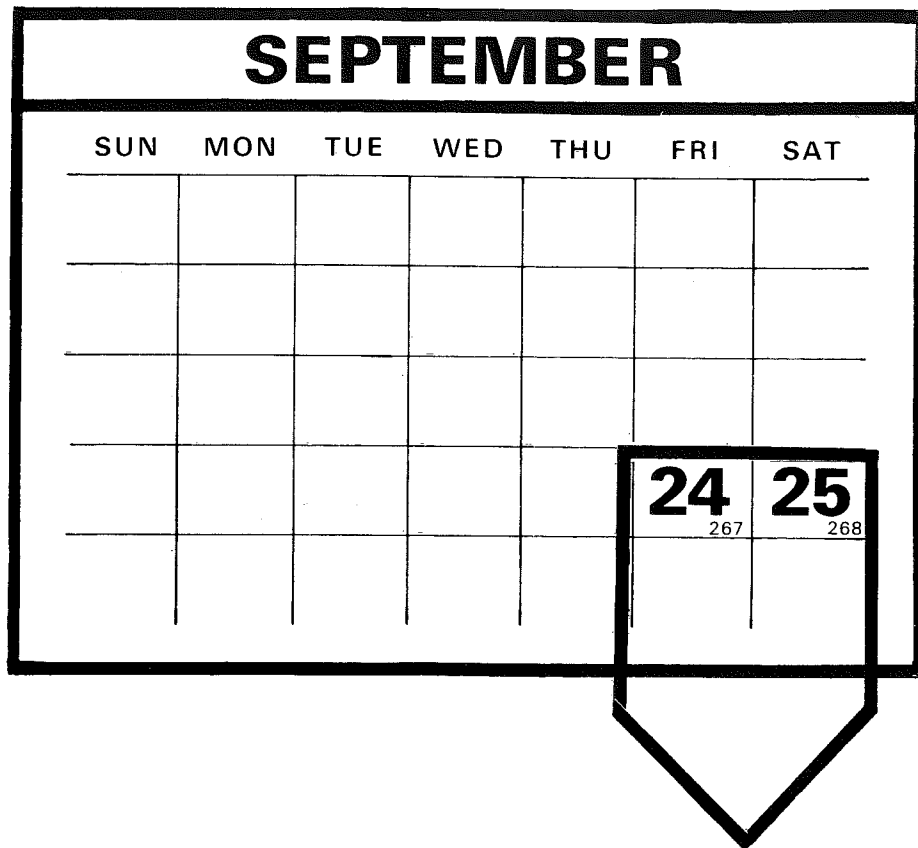

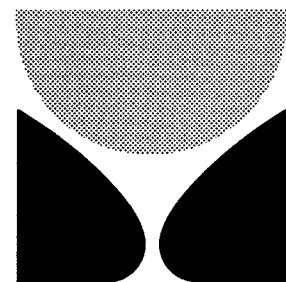

At Delhi, his guidance is also evident. He expanded not only its physical campus, but its educational focus to include arts and sciences, business administration, hotel management, parks and recreation, nursing, veterinary science, and engineering technology.

President Kunsela's educational expertise has not been limited to the institutions he has headed. He is also recognized internationally as an authority on vocational, technical and professional education. He has served as a consultant for the United Nations, the World Bank, the U.S. Agency for International Development, and the Ford Foundation for technical assistance programs relating to the establishment and maintenance of educational systems in developing nations. His wealth of experience has been utilized in projects in Israel, Greece, Brazil, Liberia, Egypt, the Philippines, Spain, India, and Nicaragua.

President Kunsela began his career in

education as an agricultural and industrial arts teacher in Middleville in 1939 after completing his bachelor's degree at Cornell University. After serving as a B-17 pilot instructor during World War II, he received his master's degree from Cornell and was employed as a regional supervisor of veterans' rehabilitation and training with the U.S. Veterans' Administration. In 1947, he became an instructor in the Agricultural Education Division, School of Education at Cornell. He received his doctorate degree in agricultural education, also at Cornell in 1950, and was named chairman of the Agricultural Education Division, Rural Education Department, School of Education there in 1951. He remained in that position until assuming the presidency of Delhi in 1955.

Dr. and Mrs. Kunsela plan to retire near Sarasota, Florida. President Kunsela says at least the first year of his retirement will be devoted to sharpening his golf game, fishing, and gardening.

Criminal Justice

Lorraine Mallet of Poughkeepsie has been named the recipient of the 1982 Award for Excellence in Criminal Justice Studies.

Lorraine graduated in May from the criminal justice program in the economic crime investigation concentration. At the college, she was a member of the Criminal Justice Club, a senator and vice president of URSA, a member of the Chancellor's Award evaluation committee and the craft fair planning committee. She participated in intramural sports and varsity basketball. Employed in the security department of IBM at Poughkeepsie for the summer, she hopes to become an inspector with the U.S. Post Office or join the New York State Police.

Technical College at Delhi. In December 1963, he was appointed professor of business administration and in 1967 was named to head the department of business management.

In 1970, he became dean of the division of business management, responsible for the academic and administrative coordination of the departments of accounting, business management, data processing and secretarial science.

As dean of non-traditional studies, a position he assumed in 1975, Dr. Cayan was responsible for the development and maintenance of programs leading to the Associate in Applied Science (A.A.S.) degree and Certificate in Individual Studies.

Before joining the State University system, Dr. Cayan served 13 years in positions dealing with employee relations, industrial engineering, personnel administration, and manufacturing.

From 1951 to 1959, he was an employee relations specialist with the General Electric Company in Schenectady.

As an assistant department manager with Albany International Corporation, he was responsible for the maintenance of production, quality control, personnel relations and safety. With the same company, Dr. Cayan also was employed as a project engineer in personnel administration and industrial engineering.

In November 1962, he joined the New York State Department of Labor in Albany as a personnel technician and later became a statistician responsible for analyzing employment data for preparation of state and federal reports.

In addition, Dr. Cayan has served as assistant coordinator and member of the advisory group of the School of Human Ecology at Cornell University as well as an adjunct professor in the School of Industrial and Labor Relations.

Also within the State University system, he is a member of the Association of Presidents of Public Community Colleges, the SUNY Task Force on Retention Improvement, and the Chancellor's Council of Presidents; vice president of Two-Year College Council of Business Faculty Administrators and Presidents, and Association Representative of the Faculty Council of Community Colleges.

In community service, Dr. Cayan serves

on the boards of directors of the Farmers National Bank in Saranac Lake, the Lake Placid Kiwanis, the Center for Music, Drama and Art in Lake Placid, the North Country Community College Association, Inc., and Essex-Franklin Lyceum, Inc.

He is the past president of the Saranac Lake Chapter of American Field Services; treasurer of the board of trustees of Educational TV, WCFE, Plattsburgh; first vice president of the board of directors of the Saranac Lake Chamber of Commerce, and is a member of Rotary International, Saranac Lake.

Dr. Cayan is a member of the Education Sub-Committee, Adirondack Park Association, Inc., and the Organizing Committee, of "The North Country Heritage Commission."

Dr. Cayan received his Doctorate of Education in higher education administration from the State University of New York at Albany in 1975. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree in economics and a Master of Business Administration from Siena College and a Master of Science degree in education from the State University of New York at Oneonta. He has completed the Institute for Educational Management Program at Harvard University.

Dr. Cayan is married to the former Jermaine Ruddy of Cohoes. The couple has three children, Mary Patricia Mellors, head nurse at Yale Medical Center; Peter J. Cayan III, director of food service at the Albany County Nursing Home and a private consultant, and Ruddy Paul Cayan, a flight attendant with Pan American Airlines.

Dr. and Mrs. Cayan are expected to reside at the College of Technology president's home on Higby Road, New Hartford.

Engineering Technology

Dr. Louis J. Galbiati, dean of engineering technology at the SUNY College of Technology, and Atlas Hsie, associate professor of industrial engineering technology at the college, will make presentations at the fall meeting of the St. Lawrence region section of the American Society of Engineering Education.

The meeting, which was hosted by the College of Technology in October 1981, will be held at RIT on October 23.

"Need for Engineering Technology Graduate and Applied Research Activities," by Dr. Galbiati, discusses paths for engineering technology students and applied research activities to be implemented on a nation-wide basis. The paper explains the need is different from the conventional research and graduate study carried on in engineering programs since those are directed toward advancing the state of knowledge while activities for engineering technology is directed at existing state of the art. 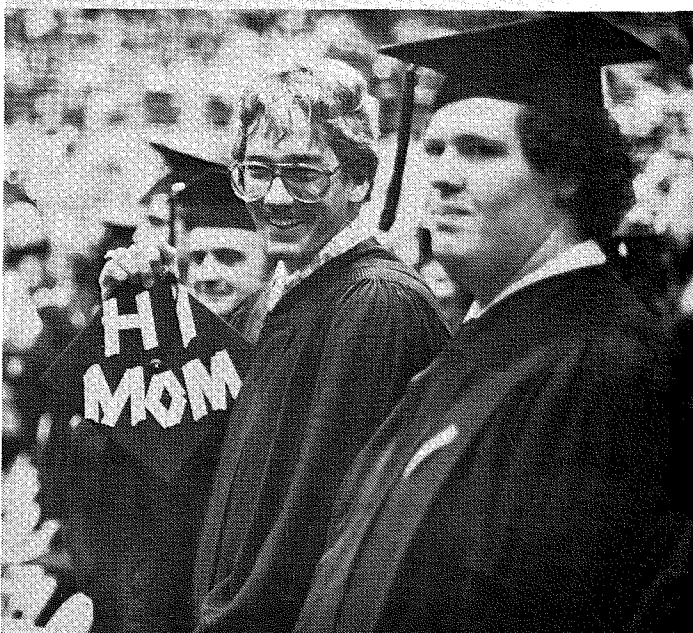

Amendment to the Constitution, freedom of speech, and the fourth Amendment, freedom from search, was presented for high school students and faculty from Oneida and Herkimer counties.

The chief constable of the Central Scotland Police was brought to the campus to address criminal justice students this spring.

Ian Thomas Oliver, a member of the London Metropolitan Police and Central Scotland Police since 1961, discussed the Scotland police system and its system of prosecution of juvenile offenders.

His appearances at the College of Technology and at Mohawk Valley Community College were arranged through the International Criminal Justice Speakers Consortium, coordinated by the John Jay College of Criminal Justice, New York.

Vocational-Technical Education

The 1981-82 academic year has been an exciting and challenging year for vocational education, nationally, statewide-wide and locally.

At the national level we have witnessed an uphill battle to preserve the federal vocational education funding. Much work has been done by many teachers and administrators to assist the American Vocational Association which represents our interests in Washington.

In New York State the federal legislation dollars provide us with the opportunity to fund demonstration programs, update equipment, provide in-service education, leadership development, curriculum development, sex equity awareness, etc., that make a difference in the quality of education in our schools. Without the federal dollars which represent approximately 8-9% of the total operating costs of programs in the state, we would experience a severe hardship in keeping pace with technology and being responsive to employer needs.

It is all of our responsibilities as vocational educators to support the professional organizations at the local, state and national level that represent our interests. Each vocational area in the state has an organization that is affiliated with other state organizations under the umbrella, NYSOEA, and nationally through AVA. Do you belong to the professional association that supports and nurtures your profession?

It is projected that there will be major changes in the economic, social and educational environments over the next 20 years that will require changes in where, when and how occupational education is offered in New York State. The State Education Department's response to the need for change is a concept of program development called "Futuring."

The Futuring of all occupational subjects areas is well underway throughout the state and is at a point where teachers, business/industry, administrators and teacher educators serving on the vast number of committees associated with the Futuring process are developing, reacting to, and approving recommendations that will impact the occupational education curriculums in the secondary schools.

Have you involved yourself in the local regional meetings in your occupational area to voice your suggestions, concerns, and recommendations? If you haven't to date, your active involvement is needed to guarantee that your curriculum area has the components to educate students with the necessary skills to obtain an entry-level position in their field upon completion of the program and provide for career ladder mobility.

The 1981-82 year produced 51 baccalaureate degrees and 29 master's degree graduates. This year marked our fifth graduating class, and, as many of you have heard through previous communications from the department, there is a strong possibility that the department's administration will be transferred to SUC Oswego within the next year.

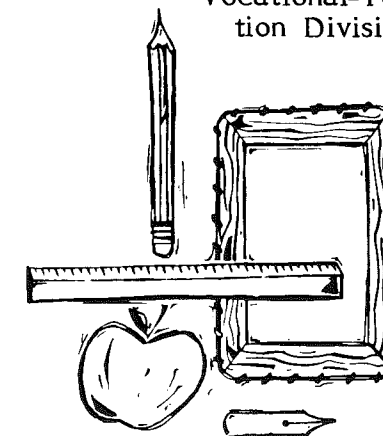
The first question many students ask is "How will this affect me?"

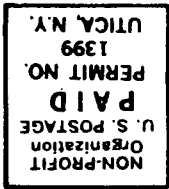
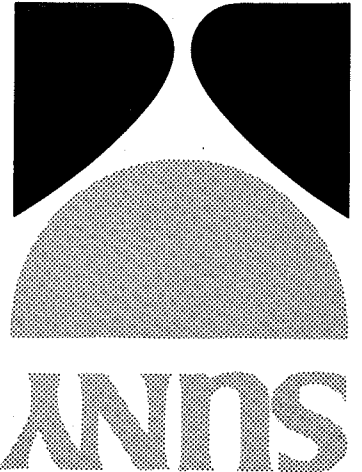
