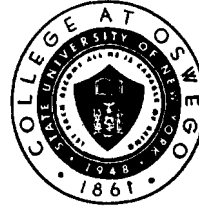


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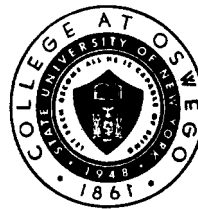
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BLACKFRIARS

BSU expressed their concern in regard to white plays and parts not incorporating blacks. Blackfriars said that they chose the best person for each individual part. Tryouts are open to every student. Lou Taravella said taht he was not happy to hear from BSU about this issue. Hoped that Blackfrairs puts on more black productions. Lynn Chadwick said that this is a general concern for Blackfriars. Tyler should make an attempt. Expressed concern over BSU's problem. Would like to see something to go on in the future. Bryan Ogden said that there has been an attempt to communicate with Blackfrairs. There must be some peace made for progress. Blackfriars said that they need more money for these productions. Mark Cantales asked if Blackfrairs could build props for a play that another organization would like to put on. There is no money in the budget said Blackfrairs. It is not our philosophy to help other organizations. We lend out props. Sue Wray said that we must be involved with meetings for input to get black plays. Blackfriars said that they would love to see BSU work with them. BSU said that they would like to see more student input in regard to what plays go on. Bruce Butler motioned to put a new line in Blackfrairs budget to match BSU's allocation of \$475 for plays. Don Ammann said that it was a terrible motion and we should open channels of communication. BSU must show an interest and they will get a play to put on. Sue Wray disagreed with the motion. BSU wants to do a play. BSU must start to get involved. BSU has raised their concern and now they must start to communicate. Not possible at this time. BSU said that they should not be mandated against Blackfrairs will. Blackfriars should request a co-sponsor line which involves other organizations on campus. Start now and maybe we can get something set up for the 1985-86 budget. Andy Csont moved the question and \$475 failed. Don motioned to move onto the budget and it passed.

1. Lighting - Request was for \$1100 and \$1100 recommended. This is an adequate amount to light shows. \$1100 passed.
2. Costume & Makeup - Request was for \$4800 and \$4800 recommended. This is a sufficient amount to fund for costumes and makeup. \$4800 passed.
3. Sets & Props - Request was \$9000 and \$9000 recommended. This amount was adequate for sets and props for three shows. Lynn motioned for \$9000 and it passed.
4. Photography - Request was for \$800 and \$800 recommended. This \$100 increase is specifically designated for a flash. Lynn Chadwick motioned for \$800 and it passed.
5. Receptions & Subscriptions - Request was for \$100 and \$100 recommended. Fund as requested. Lynn Chadwick motioned for \$100 and it passed.
6. Publicity - Request was for \$1000 and \$1000 recommended. This is a very important amount to publicize productions. Lynn Chadwick motioned for \$1000 and itpassed.

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7. Sound - Request was for \$600 and \$600 recommended. This amount is necessary for recording materials, special effects and records. Andy Csont motioned for \$600 and it passed.
8. Royalties - Request was for \$1100 and recommendation was \$1100. This amount is sufficient for royalties of production. Lynn Chadwick motioned for \$1100 and it passed.
9. Treasurer Salary - Request was for \$400 and \$400 recommended. Don Ammann motioned for \$300. The organization said that the salary is lower than the other organizations. It has never been raised. Lynn Chadwick called the question and there was an objection. The organization said that SA instituted the line because they felt the quality of the treasurer would go up. Karen McCarthy said that a lot of running around goes along with the job. \$300 passed.

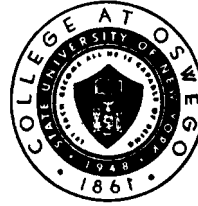

Lou Taravella made a suggestion that lines of communication remain open between Blackfrairs and any other SA funded organization willing to co-sponsor or work with a Blackfriars production,
-and that Blackfrairs, an SA funded organization, make consideration towards minorities in all parts casted and towards looking into a Black production in the near future,
-and that all parts casted should in no way be discriminated against because that part of specifically calling for a particular race,
-and that students have a greater input into the productions which Blackfriars undertakes.
The motion passed.

OCC

Bruce Butler said that OCC represents large part of the student body to further general welling being of off campus students. Judy Powers asked if they had ever been funded before and they said no. Lou asked if they were like a dorm council. The organization said there are but they have no allocation from housing for programming. Lou Taravella felt that we were making up for the decision of people to move off campus. Mike Marino asked how they have been funded in the past. Bruce Butler said they fundraised \$800. He added that off campus students have no means to get funds from vending machiens and video games. Karen McCarthy felt strongly not funding the organization. Money going into the organization would be spent unfairly. OCC appoints senators and there is a direct tie to the senate. Maureen McDonald brought up the point that Don Harrison has offered to give them money. Bruce said that there are obligations tied to taking the money. Mark Cantales said that OCC is asking for a little help. 48% of the students live off campus and this accounts for only \$.50 per person. Bryan Ogden

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said that we should not fund them all of the money. They pay their fee and should be allotted something. Lou Taravella made a motion for \$0. He has seen strides by OCC. Karen McCarthy said that we spread money out through two organizations for off campus people and supported Lou's motion. Sue Wray said that if their budget is passed, we are setting a precedent for any dorm council to come for funding. OCC is a legislative body and appoints senators. Sue Castrigno said that if OCC needs money for elections, they should come to the senate for money. Felt that if off campus students were not getting what they were asking for, then OCA and LOCO lines should be increased. Bob Ghosio said that they need certain things to function. Must advertise because OCC has many good ideas. Spoke against the \$0 motion. Judy Powers said that she agreed with \$0. She was going against how her constituents would want her to vote but felt that she had a bigger obligation to SA. Diedre Malecki called the question and \$0 passed.

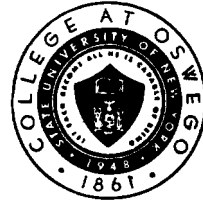
BIT 'N SPUR

1. General Operations - Request was for \$259.70 and \$150.15 was recommended. Lynn Chadwick motioned for \$150.15 and it passed.
 2. Transportation - Request was for \$2416.20 and \$847 was recommended. Karen said that this is enough for eight shows sufficient to subsidize. Costs of the organization is going through the roof. The organization said that 10 shows is the norm in other regions and would like to stick with 10. Let the organization pick the eight shows where they perform best. Want the nationals to be funded because if someone makes it, they find out only seven days before hand and that is not enough time to come before the Senate. Lynn Chadwick made a motion for \$847 and it failed. Mike Marino wanted to fund for \$0 because the competition is not open to all. Andy Csont motioned for \$1036.50 - passed.
 3. Entry Fees and Tolls - Request was for \$885 and \$212.50 was recommended. The organization said that they already pay \$13.50 by themselves/person. Lynn Chadwick motioned to fund at \$262.50 and it failed. Lou Taravella motioned for \$350 and it passed.
 4. Meals and Lodging - Request was for \$2398 and \$960 was recommended. The organization said that they need more than last year because there are more people. Lynn Chadwick motioned for \$1620 and it passed.
 5. New lines - Request was for \$3312 for a coach recommendation was \$0. Karen McCarthy said that we do not pay for coaches. Show would not be accessible for most students. Don Ammann made a motion for \$0. and it passed.
 6. Show costs - Request was for \$1582.50 and recommendation was \$0. Andy Csont motioned for \$0 and it passed.

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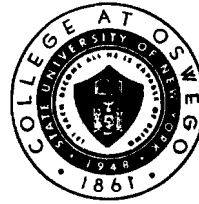

Minutes

The meeting was called to order at 6:10.

Roll call was taken and Beth Kucker, Patti Tower, Bill Quirk and Amy Bartell were absent. Jeff Baum, Bob Ghosio and Sue Zimmerman were absent with a proxy.

The agenda was approved with Bill 67 added to New Business, Bill 60 off the table, and Bill 65 on Special Orders.

The minutes were approved as is.

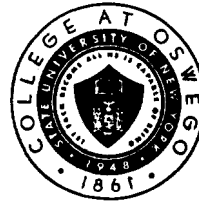
EXECUTIVE REPORT

Sue Wray - Mark Walthour was appointed as a Supreme Court Justice.
-Chris Bonnell and Joanne Vitalone resigned as senators.
-Mary Fish was sworn in as senator from Johnson Hall.
-Auxiliary Services - Board rates will be increased \$70.
-The 19 meal plan will be \$1110/year, DC 360 \$962/year, DC 280 \$882/year. Jay Button said that this is only an increase of \$2.18/week.
-Beth Kucker resigned as the Elections chair. She did a lot of hard work.

Supreme Court - Case brought forward - Dave Rothstein and Bruce Butler vs the Elections Committee. Bill 3 required that there be instructions for write-ins and voting at all polls. There was no instructions posted properly at each poll. After deliberation the verdict was that the committee was in violation and that the elections should be entirely done over.

Alan Roggen said that there were documents on every polling station but they were taped facing the poll watchers. The instructions were inadequate. When a person asks how to write-in, this is an infringement of his privacy.
-Budgets have been going on every night. The senate has consisted of 12. This is the responsibility of each Senator. We need quorum.

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COMMITTEE REPORTS

Community Relations - The high school students will not be coming to see us before spring break. The committee will work to get them here afterwards.

-Men's group. First meeting went well. Open forum to talk about issues which concern them and their relations with other men and women. Meetings are 6:00 on Thursdays.

Rules - Bill 60 passed unanimously. There was a motion to censor Julio Gracia and Michael Poole.

Alan Roggen said that it was not right to censor Julio because of the position that he was in running for president. Mike Poole said that he was not given a copy of the rules of the senate or a copy of the constitution. He was unaware of the fact of the attendance policy. When he has come for the meeting he has stayed the whole time, not like other senators who come for an hour and then leave. Lou Taravella said that some senators come for attendance and then leave. There is a misconception of their responsibilities. Rules went by the attendance book. Julio said that as a presidential candidate he could not be here during the Senate hearings. Feel it will be a political issue. Tried to get proxies. Quorum is a big problem. He would have come for quorum and then abstained from each budget because he is a candidate. Censored himself. Mark Tayler said that Rules committee is just doing their job. Lynn Chadwick felt that not sending a proxy because you could not find a responsible one is a justified excuse. As far as being a presidential candidate, you are a senator first. If you cannot fulfill your obligations as a senator you cannot fulfill your obligations as president. Mike Poole said that Rules is doing their job not, but not before because he was not given the information. The vote to censor Julio Gracia passed by a vote of 12y, 3n, 2a, 1a. The vote to censor Mike Poole failed by a vote of 5y, 7n, 13a.

Student Services - Petitions will be circulating to get a self service post office in the Union.

Elections - Needed poll watchers. Thanked the core of people who have helped with the elections. E. J. Cuneo said that he was proud of the way everybody worked together on Elections and wished the Senate would work just as hard.

Off Campus Committee - No formal report. Meetings are 5:30 on Thurs. in room 226.

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PPB - No formal report.

Faculty Assembly - No formal report.

Surplus Committee - No formal report.

OLD BUSINESS

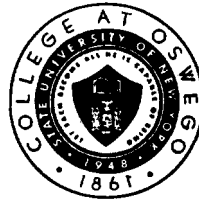
Bill 60 - Moved into Finance as a whole. Sue Gaffney explained each event. Sue Wray said that they were going by the club guidelines. Passed Finance. \$175.05 passed.

Bill 62 - Mike Murray said that the bill should not come up now. There is no need for this. After tonight we should be able to make a decision on SASU. The average student will not be aware of the issues. Lynn Chadwick said that the referendum could not feasibly take place before April 1. Bill tabled by a vote of 18y, 0n, 2a.

Bill 65 - Moved into Rules as a whole. Mike Nemecek asked if the funding for this was in last years budget. It was with a stipulation that \$150 be used for entertainment. Passed Rules. Moved into Finance as a whole. Mary Jane Rich asked why they were asking for \$600 more. Chris Mensah said that the band costs have gone up. Bryan Ogden asked if raising the ticket price would affect sales. Chris said yes and added that PPB has exhausted all of their funds. Passed Finance. Miguel Montes said that the dinner interculturally mixes the students. Urged the senate to support the band. Andy Csont said that it is a great experience to interact with the students, professors and community. Urged all to pass. Bill Quirk said that this would be a big extravaganza. \$600 was too much for entertainment. Don Ammann said that the dinner is great and made a motion to have a \$300 income line on the \$600 allocation. People will be willing to pay extra dollar on ticket prices. This would give the event a \$950 total income line and it was accepted. Karen McCarthy said that a \$300 income line was not unreasonable. It increases the student's likelihood of going to the dinner. Mike Murray added a stipulation that there be two ticket sales. One for the dinner and band, and another for just the band. Bill 65 passed by a vote of 17y, 0n, 1a.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:17.

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The 32nd meeting was called to order at 8:45.

Roll call was taken and Julio Gracia, Beth Kucker, Patti Tower, Janet O'Hara, Jeff Baum, and Sue Zimmerman were absent. Bob Ghosio was absent with a proxy.

LEGAL AIDS

1. Attorney Fees - Request was for \$3202.50 and \$2450.00 recommended. This is based on 70 hours at \$35.00/hour. Steve Goldberg said that if the amount of hours is cut, you will be undercutting the students. He has missed hours this year, but this is not to say this will happen in the future. He has been very busy this year. Karen McCarthy said that based on history, he has come to the office for about 70 hours and this is what we should budget for. Andy Csont motioned to fund at \$2450.00 and it passed by a vote of 14y, 2n, 0a.
2. Office Supplies - Request was for \$300 and \$340 recommended. Karen said that this will allow for new publications, updates, copying, and more advertising. Andy Csont motioned for \$340 and it passed.

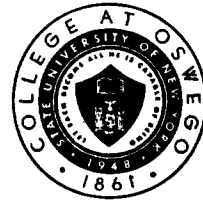

3. Public Relations - Request was for \$112 and \$112 recommended. It passed.
4. Medical Expenses - Request was for \$2190.70 and \$1890.70 recommended. The shock trousers should go through fixed assets. \$1890.70 passed.
5. Office Supplies - Request was for \$481.41 and \$200 recommended. Miguel motioned for \$200. John Bondi made a friendly amendment for \$281.41 and it was not accepted. \$200 passed by a vote of

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16y, 3n, 1a.

6. Personnel - Request was for \$745.95 and \$276.50 recommended. Diedre Malecki motioned for \$276.50. Miguel Montes made a friendly amendment for \$303.95 to fund for the clock and more patches. 7. Conference - Request was for \$150 and \$100 recommended. The organization said that they would like more money because they want to send more members. Alan Roggen motioned for \$100. Mary Jane Rich made a friendly amendment for \$150 and it was accepted. \$150 passed by a vote of 11y, 10n, 2a.

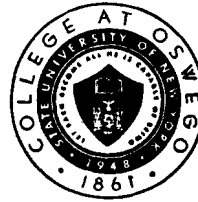
SASU

Request was for \$19704 and \$0 recommended by Budget Council. The rationale was that Oswego is a strong government. SASU should provide visibility, accountability and structure. We have to change for the times and conditions. We are breaking a trend, we have funded SASU for 15 years. We must be very supportive if we are going to send \$20000 off campus. Jim Tierney said that he wanted to answer all questions. SASU can change. It is a flexible organization. SASU founded in 1970 and it is a student run organization. The main purposes of SASU is to protect the quality of SUNY, protect students rights (voting, dorm or tenant, drinking age, women's safety), and student governance. SASU is a membership institution and there are nine full time staff members. Scott Wexler said that SASU is incorporated. The foundation of SASU is based on contributions for tax purposes. This is a combined \$200,000 budget. There is a flowing budget which is approved by delegates and guided by the board of directors and officers. \$200,000 breakdown.

- \$50,000 goes directly to campus activities
- 4 field organizers
- 50% of organizer directors salary
- Travel budget \$8000
- 1/3 of legislative director
- Communications director
- Research director
- printer 50% in houseprinting

There is also administrative support which includes salaries, insurance. The average staff salary is 40hours/week. They receive \$9100 which is an average of about \$4.38/hour.

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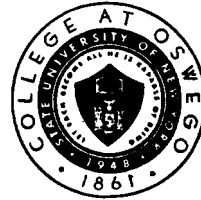
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Jennifer Wischer motioned for \$19704. Rick Lee said that what we are voting on is a concept - support of students and SUNY. Sue Castrigno said that SASU has many problems in it but she wanted each of the senators to ask the question "where will we go if we fund SASU at \$0" Who will we call for help. Karen McCarthy said that we should not have to wait for a crisis on campus for SASU to show up. There have been promises for 15 years. She has not seen these promises fulfilled. There has to be a turning point sometime. Janine Frainier made an analogy. What would happen if the SA fee was not mandatory. Do you think UMO would be funded or even SAVAC. Not one of you in this room has ever come to me to air grievances. Everytime there is a conference each one of you has the opportunity to go but do you? Allison Zane said that there is apathy on this campus which is out of control. Without SASU things would be much worse. We are not speaking about \$19000 per person. We are speaking about \$3.00/person. She felt that each person on this campus reaps much more than \$3.00 from SASU. \$3.00 is a small price to pay for what they could be doing for us. Lou Taravella said that he has been in SA for a long time and in the beginning did not know what SASU was. Now we know. SASU said to have a better letter writing campaign. Do we get paper and envelopes from SASU. We get directories, but do we get told who are our friends and who are our enemies. Things that really concern us were never told to us by SASU. I want SASU to look at the problems on our campus. I don't feel it's going to happen. We went to court for voting rights and what did SASU do. Sure they called us and gave us a name of a lawyer but that's it. I'm not in favor of funding SASU at \$19,000. It's time Oswego said we are not going to fund everyone's problems - too many schools get a free ride from our fees. Sue Wray said that when she ran for vice president she did not have any ideas about SASU. We have become sophisticated from SASU. I firmly believe our pulling out will cause a domino effect throughout the SUNY system. Can you really blame SASU, what about our delegates. Why don't they have to be held accountable? SASU doesn't neglect us. We made concerns about an organizer, he was taken care of. Did we praise them when they did that? Why did you wait till now to air concerns? It's too drastic to go to zero. SASU has trained Sue and she learned organizing skills from them that are invaluable. I don't envy the student body or SA if SASU is funded at zero. We trained you now, but who will you turn to when things change. Linda Hoo said that a lot of good points have been brought out. A lot she also did not agree with. Think of this \$3.00 as an investment in your future. It's your responsibility to invest and support your future. We have 22 year

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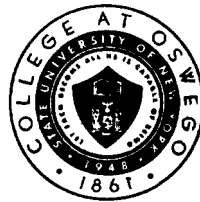
olds in this organization being listened to by 30-40-50 year olds. All the points brought out will be taken into consideration. We will be making a big step forward. We have a responsibility to every student not only ours but every student in this state. Think about what everyone has said. Bill Quirk said that Sue Castrigno and Rick Lee had spoken about a change from within. We have three delegates here, what better time for a change. SASU admits their faults, what better reason to fund them at \$0 or at a reduces rate. Geoff Weiss asked if fees could be dropped to \$1 or \$1.50/person and have other schools come in that don't fund now? I'd like to see us stay with SASU, and will vote in favor of funding them. Dave Rothstein raised the question about accountability. What about each senator who has not gone back to your constituency and discussed SASU. Sure SASU has made mistakes, but what about our own. Pete Devine said that when he went through it with Budget Council he did not know how he stood with SASU. What is our responsibility to SASU and what is their responsibility to us? If we decide to fund SASU we have to straighten our the situation. Budget Council and the Senate's concerns are a good starting point. Lou Taravella said that he would be in favor of the bill except that a committee open to everybody should be set up to address the concerns and issues of SASU. Jennifer Wischer accepted the amendment. Mike Nemecek was glad that the stipulation was made. Hope it helps people to decide. You are deciding many issues tonight concerning SASU. I'll point a finger at myself for slacking off as a delegate, but one should be pointed at each of the senators in this room because you have never approached me. Steering committee is a good idea. We can't expect SASU to give us every penny back that we give them. We should stay with them and see what happens. If a problem still exists, then we should fund them at zero. Dave McNally called the question. E. J. Cuneo motioned for roll call. The budget passed by a vote of 22y, 3n, 0a.

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The 33rd Meeting was called to order at 5:40 on Thursday, March 8, 1984.

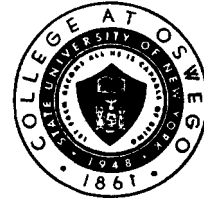

WTOP

1. Programming - Request was for \$4100 and \$3230 recommended. Bob Ziegler said that TOP wants to increase their library of permanent programming. This will increase WTOP's quality. Don Ammann motioned for \$3230 and it passed.
2. Production - Request was for \$230 and \$230 recommended. John Bondi called the question and it passed.
3. Publicity and public relations - Request was for \$150 and \$89.60 recommended. Miguel Montes motioned for \$89.60 and it passed.
4. Telephone - Request was for \$600 and \$400 recommended. Miguel Montes motioned for \$400 and it passed.
5. Broadcast operations and engineering - Request was for 2752.46 and \$1822.46 recommended. The organization said that they need to have molding to secure the wires. The Senate Elections Committee shall make this determination 10 to 15 days after the Fall and Spring final registration dates, to be used for the Fall and Spring Elections respectively.

- WHEREAS, in just the last year, the age at which persons may legally purchase and be served alcoholic beverages in New York State was raised to 19 years old, and
- WHEREAS, Senator Frank Padavan of Queens and Assemblyperson Melvin Zimmer of Onondaga County have introduced legislation in both the Senate and Assembly to increase the legal age from 19 to 21, and
- WHEREAS, Governor Mario Cuomo has supported the new legislation, and
- WHEREAS, there exist hundreds of studies on the legal drinking age and its effects. Most of the studies concerning the legal drinking age and its effect on driving conflict. Each side of the issue will cite their own statistics, but based on the evidence, there is no undisputed proof that raising the drinking age necessarily results in fewer alcohol related accidents, and
- WHEREAS, over 99% of all 19 and 20 year-olds who hold drivers licenses are not involved in alcohol related traffic accidents. By raising the drinking age to 21, over 99% of the affected group would lose a privilege that they have used responsibly in order to reduce the number of alcohol related traffic incidents that are created by a tiny minority (.6% of the affected group),* and
- WHEREAS, there exists virtually universal agreement on one component of the overall argument; that strict enforcement of existing drunk driving laws coupled with education and publicity is the best possible deterrent of drunk driving, therefore

- WHEREAS, the Alcoholic Beverage Committee is an all-College body comprised of student, faculty and administrative representatives, and
- WHEREAS, the Committee is responsible for determining the appropriateness of alcoholic beverages at registered events; establishing procedures that are consistent with the policy on the use of alcohol as approved by the College Council; and maintaining a continuing educational and evaluative function regarding the use of alcoholic beverages by members of the College community, and
- WHEREAS, since the inception of the Alcoholic Beverage Policy, the College has attempted to carry out that policy through a system of voluntary compliance on the part of students attending alcohol-related events and primary enforcement of policy by sponsors/planners of those events, and
- WHEREAS, the Committee has determined that this system has not functioned effectively since the approved age was raised from 18 to 19 years of age; specifically, that students under the legal drinking age are obtaining and consuming alcohol at registered activities on the campus, and
- WHEREAS, the College's Alcoholic Beverage Policy mandates that the Committee take action to correct such misuses, and
- WHEREAS, the Committee has unanimously affirmed its support of the present policy, which permits students under 19 years of age to participate in events at which alcohol is served with the understanding that those individuals will not consume alcoholic beverages, and
- WHEREAS, for the next eight (8) weeks, the Committee will be evaluating student adherence to this policy in order to determine whether a policy change is necessary to enforce compliance, therefore

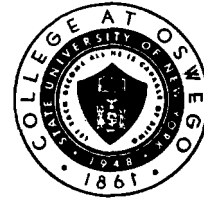

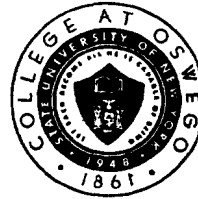
