Abstract:

One of the most important contributions to the debates about fossils in the seventeenth century came from a Sicilian painter. Agostino Scilla's *Vain Speculation Undeceived by Sense* (1670) combined his skills as an artist, observer, and scholar to present a new theory of fossil formation in words and images. This talk reconstructs the genesis of Scilla's project as a case study in the relations between art and science in seventeenth-century Italy.
